San Bernardino Associated Governments (SANBAG) is a council of governments formed in 1973 by joint powers agreement of the cities and the County of San Bernardino. SANBAG is governed by a Board of Directors consisting of a mayor or designated council member from each of the twenty-four cities in San Bernardino County and the five members of the San Bernardino County Board of Supervisors.

In addition to SANBAG, the composition of the SANBAG Board of Directors also serves as the governing board for several separate legal entities listed below:

***The San Bernardino County Transportation Commission**, which is responsible for short and long range transportation planning within San Bernardino County, including coordination and approval of all public mass transit service, approval of all capital development projects for public transit and highway projects, and determination of staging and scheduling of construction relative to all transportation improvement projects in the Transportation Improvement Program.*

***The San Bernardino County Transportation Authority**, which is responsible for administration of the voter-approved half-cent transportation transactions and use tax levied in the County of San Bernardino.*

***The Service Authority for Freeway Emergencies**, which is responsible for the administration and operation of a motorist aid system of call boxes on State freeways and highways within San Bernardino County.*

***The Congestion Management Agency**, which analyzes the performance level of the regional transportation system in a manner which ensures consideration of the impacts from new development and promotes air quality through implementation of strategies in the adopted air quality plans.*

*As a **Subregional Planning Agency**, SANBAG represents the San Bernardino County subregion and assists the Southern California Association of Governments in carrying out its functions as the metropolitan planning organization. SANBAG performs studies and develops consensus relative to regional growth forecasts, regional transportation plans, and mobile source components of the air quality plans.*

Items which appear on the monthly Board of Directors agenda are subjects of one or more of the listed legal authorities. For ease of understanding and timeliness, the agenda items for all of these entities are consolidated on one agenda. Documents contained in the agenda package are clearly marked with the appropriate legal entity.

Meeting Procedures and Rules of Conduct

Meeting Procedures

The Ralph M. Brown Act is the state law which guarantees the public's right to attend and participate in meetings of local legislative bodies. These rules have been adopted by the Board of Directors in accordance with the Brown Act, Government Code 54950 et seq., and shall apply at all meetings of the Board of Directors and Policy Committees.

Accessibility

The SANBAG meeting facility is accessible to persons with disabilities. If assistive listening devices or other auxiliary aids or services are needed in order to participate in the public meeting, requests should be made through the Clerk of the Board at least three (3) business days prior to the Board meeting. The Clerk's telephone number is (909) 884-8276 and office is located at 1170 W. 3rd Street, 2nd Floor, San Bernardino, CA.

Agendas – All agendas are posted at 1170 W. 3rd Street, 2nd Floor, San Bernardino at least 72 hours in advance of the meeting, Staff reports related to agenda items may be reviewed at the SANBAG offices located at 1170 W. 3rd Street, 2nd Floor, San Bernardino and our website: www.sanbag.ca.gov.

Agenda Actions – Items listed on both the “Consent Calendar” and “Items for Discussion” contain suggested actions. The Board of Directors will generally consider items in the order listed on the agenda. However, items may be considered in any order. New agenda items can be added and action taken by two-thirds vote of the Board of Directors.

Closed Session Agenda Items – Consideration of closed session items *excludes* members of the public. These items include issues related to personnel, pending litigation, labor negotiations and real estate negotiations. Prior to each closed session, the Chair will announce the subject matter of the closed session. If action is taken in closed session, the Chair may report the action to the public at the conclusion of the closed session.

Public Testimony on an Item – Members of the public are afforded an opportunity to speak on any listed item. Individuals wishing to address the Board of Directors or Policy Committee Members should complete a “Request to Speak” form, provided at the rear of the meeting room, and present it to the Clerk prior to the Board's consideration of the item. A “Request to Speak” form must be completed for *each* item an individual wishes to speak on. When recognized by the Chair, speakers should be prepared to step forward and announce their name and address for the record. In the interest of facilitating the business of the Board, speakers are limited to three (3) minutes on each item. Additionally, a twelve (12) minute limitation is established for the total amount of time any one individual may address the Board at any one meeting. The Chair or a majority of the Board may establish a different time limit as appropriate, and parties to agenda items shall not be subject to the time limitations.

The Consent Calendar is considered a single item, thus the three (3) minute rule applies. Consent Calendar items can be pulled at Board member request and will be brought up individually at the specified time in the agenda allowing further public comment on those items.

Agenda Times – The Board is concerned that discussion take place in a timely and efficient manner. Agendas may be prepared with estimated times for categorical areas and certain topics to be discussed. These times may vary according to the length of presentation and amount of resulting discussion on agenda items.

Public Comment – At the end of the agenda, an opportunity is also provided for members of the public to speak on any subject within the Board's authority. *Matters raised under “Public Comment” may not be acted upon at that meeting. “Public Testimony on any Item” still apply.*

Disruptive Conduct – If any meeting of the Board is willfully disrupted by a person or by a group of persons so as to render the orderly conduct of the meeting impossible, the Chair may recess the meeting or order the person, group or groups of person willfully disrupting the meeting to leave the meeting or to be removed from the meeting. Disruptive conduct includes addressing the Board without first being recognized, not addressing the subject before the Board, repetitiously addressing the same subject, failing to relinquish the podium when requested to do so, or otherwise preventing the Board from conducting its meeting in an orderly manner. *Please be aware that a NO SMOKING policy has been established for meetings. Your cooperation is appreciated!*

**SANBAG General Practices for Conducting Meetings
of
Board of Directors and Policy Committees**

Attendance.

- The Chair of the Board or a Policy Committee (Chair) has the option of taking attendance by Roll Call or Self-Introductions. If attendance is taken by Roll Call, the Clerk of the Board will call out by jurisdiction or supervisorial district. The Member or Alternate will respond by stating his/her name. If attendance is by Self-Introduction, the Member or Alternate will state his/her name and jurisdiction or supervisorial district.
- A Member/Alternate, who arrives after attendance is taken, shall announce his/her name prior to voting on any item.
- A Member/Alternate, who wishes to leave the meeting after attendance is taken but before remaining items are voted on, shall announce his/her name and that he/she is leaving the meeting.

Basic Agenda Item Discussion.

- The Chair announces the agenda item number and states the subject.
- The Chair calls upon the appropriate staff member or Board Member to report on the item.
- The Chair asks members of the Board/Committee if they have any questions or comments on the item. General discussion ensues.
- The Chair calls for public comment based on "Request to Speak" forms which may be submitted.
- Following public comment, the Chair announces that public comment is closed and asks if there is any further discussion by members of the Board/Committee.
- The Chair calls for a motion from members of the Board/Committee.
- Upon a motion, the Chair announces the name of the member who makes the motion. Motions require a second by a member of the Board/Committee. Upon a second, the Chair announces the name of the Member who made the second, and the vote is taken.
- The "aye" votes in favor of the motion shall be made collectively. Any Member who wishes to oppose or abstain from voting on the motion, shall individually and orally state the Member's "nay" vote or abstention. Members present who do not individually and orally state their "nay" vote or abstention shall be deemed, and reported to the public, to have voted "aye" on the motion.

The Vote as specified in the SANBAG Bylaws.

- Each Member of the Board of Directors shall have one vote. In the absence of the official representative, the alternate shall be entitled to vote. (Board of Directors only.)
- Voting may be either by voice or roll call vote. A roll call vote shall be conducted upon the demand of five official representatives present, or at the discretion of the presiding officer.

Amendment or Substitute Motion.

- Occasionally a Board Member offers a substitute motion before the vote on a previous motion. In instances where there is a motion and a second, the maker of the original motion is asked if he/she would like to amend the motion to include the substitution or withdraw the motion on the floor. If the maker of the original motion does not want to amend or withdraw, the substitute motion is not addressed until after a vote on the first motion.
- Occasionally, a motion dies for lack of a second.

Call for the Question.

- At times, a Member of the Board/Committee may “Call for the Question.”
- Upon a “Call for the Question,” the Chair may order that the debate stop or may allow for limited further comment to provide clarity on the proceedings.
- Alternatively and at the Chair’s discretion, the Chair may call for a vote of the Board/Committee to determine whether or not debate is stopped.
- The Chair re-states the motion before the Board/Committee and calls for the vote on the item.

The Chair.

- At all times, meetings are conducted in accordance with the Chair’s direction.
- These general practices provide guidelines for orderly conduct.
- From time-to-time circumstances require deviation from general practice.
- Deviation from general practice is at the discretion of the Chair.

Courtesy and Decorum.

- These general practices provide for business of the Board/Committee to be conducted efficiently, fairly and with full participation.
- It is the responsibility of the Chair and Members to maintain common courtesy and decorum.

Task 0309 General Transit

Comprehensive Transportation Plan (CTP) and Congestion Management Program (CMP) development as well as tracking the feasibility of including transit corridors and other transit-related recommendations contained in the Regional Transportation Plan.

Task 0310 Transit Operating

Purpose

Provide funding for the operation of seven transit operators in San Bernardino County , including Omnitrans, Victor Valley Transit Authority (VVTA), Morongo Basin Transit Authority (MBTA), Mountain Area Regional Transit Authority (MARTA), Barstow Area Transit (BAT), Needles Area Transit (NAT), and Valley Transportation Services (VTrans).

Accomplishments

During prior Fiscal Years, the SANBAG Budget included individual tasks for each of the transit operators. These tasks had historically been used to account for individualized staff assistance for each of the transit operators. However, now that SANBAG is directly receiving all of the Senior and Disabled Transit funds for the County and SANBAG created a new Consolidated Services Transportation Agency, VTrans, general transit support and assistance related activities are consolidated under (Task 0310) General Transit. This task provides for the consolidation of transit operating funds that are provided to each of the transit operators. This structure mirrors the structure that has been used successfully under the Commuter Rail program.

The operating funds provided to the transit operators offer financial assistance to offset costs associated with paratransit service by the transit operators for those that meet the qualifications under the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). The operating funds administered under this task are also used to provide subsidized fares for seniors.

Additionally, other fund sources within this task offer additional contributions to offset supplementary types of operating cost, such as the recently initiated San Bernardino Regional Vanpool Program – Victor Valley phase.

Work Elements

SANBAG and VVTA coordinated to secure a \$1.49 million dollar Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Section 5309 discretionary grant to create and operate a successful vanpool program within the High Desert and Barstow areas. VVTA is the direct recipient of these funds and is operating and managing this Vanpool program. Fiscal Year 2014/2015 is the final year in which SANBAG will provide contribution to the program.

Purpose

Evaluate the effectiveness and efficiency and implement capital improvements proposed by the transit agencies within the County of San Bernardino.

Accomplishments

Omnitrans completed work on the sbX Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) project along the “E” Street corridor. The “E” street BRT is the first such transit service to be implemented in the San Bernardino Valley. Revenue service operations began in the fourth quarter of Fiscal Year 2013/2014.

SANBAG, in partnership with Omnitrans, awarded the construction contract for the San Bernardino Transit Center (SBTC) in the third quarter of Fiscal Year 2013/2014. SBTC will be the major hub for mass transit services in San Bernardino Valley, including twenty-two bus bays and three rail platforms for Metrolink and the Redlands Passenger Rail service. Construction of the SBTC is expected to last approximately 12 months and be completed in March 2015. Immediate access to the Rialto Avenue sbX station will provide connectivity from California State University San Bernardino to Loma Linda University providing enhanced mobility options for students, faculty and visitors. The extension of the San Bernardino and Inland Empire Orange County Metrolink lines to the SBTC will provide unprecedented access to the entire Southern California region from Downtown San Bernardino.

SANBAG completed a Comprehensive Operational Analysis of Omnitrans which resulted in funding and cost projections through Fiscal Year 2019/2020. Based on these projections, it was determined that Omnitrans would realize an average annual operational funding deficit of \$2.5 million dollars, totaling \$12.8 million through Fiscal Year 2019/2020. An annual capital surplus of \$1.4 million, totaling \$10.5 million through Fiscal Year 2019/2020 was also identified. Based on these projections, the Omnitrans Board of Directors tasked staff with finding efficiencies to bridge the operating funding deficit, while maintaining existing service levels and incorporating the sbX BRT route.

Victor Valley Transit Authority (VVTA) completed a Comprehensive Operational Analysis (COA), which resulted in updating of service alignments and most importantly the implementation of Sunday service. The COA also included the expansion of BV Link (Barstow to Victor Valley) from three days to five days as well as continuing from Victor Valley to San Bernardino.

Valley Transportation Services (VTrans) continued to operate the Mobility Travel Training program (MTT), which is a three-year project totaling \$1.23 million dollars, which began in 2012. MTT teaches seniors and persons with disabilities how to navigate public transportation. VTrans is also a funding partner for the U.S. Department of Veteran Affairs One Call/One Click program which provides veterans and their families a centralized location where they can access information on social services and public transportation. VTrans is an active funding partner to many social services agencies to help reduce access service demands.

Work Elements

The SBTC will be in construction during Fiscal Year 2014/2015. Construction is expected to last approximately 12 months and will be open and operational by the end of Fiscal Year 2014/2015.

A Short Range Transit Plan (SRTP) will be created for the Transit and Rail department at SANBAG. The elements included will be funding projections for SANBAG's future rail projects, all six bus transit operators, Metrolink and the Valley Transportation services (VTrans). Additionally it will discuss service and future needs of all transit and rail in San Bernardino County. This SRTP is needed to submit as part of SANBAG's request to be FTA Grantee's.

With the successful implementation of the Vanpool Program – Victor Valley phase, SANBAG will analyze the potential for expanding the Vanpool program county wide in conjunction with the County-Wide Transit

Efficiency Study. The Vanpool program potentially would provide the San Bernardino County with additional federal funds which can be used on transit under the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Section 5307 guidelines.

During Fiscal Year 2013/2014 a consolidation study was completed by SANBAG staff to determine if consolidating transit agencies resources would be cost effective. It was determined that Victor Valley Transit Authority (VVTA) and Barstow Area Transit (BAT) would be good candidates for possible consolidation. The analysis determined both VVTA and BAT would benefit from a consolidation into one new transit agency that included an annual \$100,000 savings for each of the member agencies. All member agencies agreed that this consolidation would be beneficial to all parties. Work has begun to implement the consolidation. The VVTA/BAT consolidation will be completed during the last quarter of Fiscal Year 2014/2015.

The City of Needles Transit Maintenance Facility is inadequate as it resides on a dirt lot behind a business. During Fiscal Year 2014/2015, SANBAG staff will assist in the acquisition and construction of this new maintenance facility.

Purpose

Work with the four other county transportation commissions that along with SANBAG comprise the Southern California Regional Rail Authority (SCRRA), the operator of the Metrolink commuter rail system to make the commuter rail program safe, efficient, and effective. Represent the San Bernardino County commuter rail interests at the regional, State, and national levels.

Accomplishments

SANBAG shares operating expenses with the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (LACMTA), the Riverside County Transportation Commission (RCTC), and the Orange County Transportation Authority (OCTA) for the three Metrolink routes that service San Bernardino County. These three lines typically carry up to 50% of the total Metrolink passengers; The San Bernardino Line alone carries about 30% and boasts the highest fare box recovery on the entire Metrolink system.

During Fiscal Year 2013/2014, SANBAG worked with the four other County Transportation Commissions and SCRRA towards the implementation of Positive Train Control, the completion of a Metrolink Strategic Plan, and assist in creating policies and procedures to ensure financial solvency.

SANBAG continued to coordinate activities with the California High-Speed Rail Authority through its Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG), San Diego Association of Governments (SANDAG), RCTC, LACMTA, and the San Diego County Regional Airport Authority for the Los Angeles to San Diego segment via San Bernardino County high-speed passenger rail corridor.

Purpose

To assist in reducing congestion, air pollution, and energy consumption by providing reliable and safe commuter rail service within and between San Bernardino County and Los Angeles, Orange, and Riverside Counties.

Accomplishments

To the extent feasible, service levels have been increased to meet the growing demand. With the current limitations of operating agreements with the Burlington Northern Santa Fe Railway and the Union Pacific Railroad, no additional weekday service can be added to the Inland Empire Orange County (IEOC) or Riverside lines. Express train service continues between San Bernardino and Los Angeles Union Station (LAUS). The express train operates one time for the morning commute to Los Angeles leaving San Bernardino with stops in Rancho Cucamonga and Covina and terminating at LAUS. The evening express train operates during the return commute with the stops at Covina and Rancho Cucamonga before terminating in San Bernardino.

Work Elements

Provide operating subsidy for Southern California Regional Rail Authority's (SCRRA) Metrolink service in San Bernardino County and payments for railroad Right of Way (ROW) maintenance. The Metrolink schedule will be modified slightly in Fiscal Year 2014/2015 to optimize operations and provide better on time performance. This task also includes the reimbursement of other agencies' expenses for maintenance of railroad ROW owned by SANBAG but not maintained by SCRRA. It also includes funding for the San Bernardino and IEOC line's weekend marketing efforts sponsored by SANBAG.

Additionally, this task tracks property management activities, including but not limited to; organization of property management files, development and implementation of property management procedures, manage and maintain property services which include marketing property for revenue generation and rail Right of Way (ROW) property maintenance. In Fiscal Year 2014/2015, a larger than usual amount of legal services have been budgeted to analyze, review and consult on potential rail litigation issues.

1. Obtain Board approval for filing Local Transportation Fund (LTF) claim for passenger rail operating assistance.
2. Process quarterly disbursements to SCRRA.
3. Monitor maintenance of railroad ROW, including determining work location, schedule, field verification of work performed, and processing payments.
4. Work with SCRRA staff to improve financial/accounting practices and monitoring.
5. Property Management of all rail Right of Way.

Purpose

Fund capital improvements and projects that result in maintaining high quality commuter rail service, safe operations, and service expansion.

Accomplishments

Since the inception of the SANBAG commuter rail program, a substantial investment has been made for the acquisition of railroad Right of Way (ROW) and commuter rail equipment as well as the construction of stations, track, and signal improvements necessary to operate safe and reliable service. With the initial and basic infrastructure in place, funding has been directed towards maintaining that investment as well as supporting the Southern California Regional Rail Authority (SCRRA) (or Metrolink) in their implementation of Positive Train Control (PTC) and the replacement and rehabilitation of locomotives to meet emission requirements.

In addition, SANBAG has begun construction on the Downtown San Bernardino Passenger Rail Project (DSBPRP), which extends Metrolink service from the Santa Fe Depot to the multi-modal San Bernardino Transit Center. Construction to expand Metrolink's Eastern Maintenance Facility, required to implement the DSBPRP, was completed. SANBAG also completed preliminary design and the draft environmental document for the Redlands Passenger Rail Project (RPRP), which will provide passenger rail service from the San Bernardino Transit Center to the University of Redlands.

SANBAG also initiated a study of alternatives to provide rail access to the Ontario International Airport. This study analyzes several alignments and mode options, including the extension of the Gold Line light rail, to connect the airport to nearby commuter rail stations. Also in partnership with Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (LACMTA), SANBAG started efforts to analyze and complete preliminary engineering of improvements to the San Gabriel Metrolink Subdivision, better known as the Metrolink San Bernardino Line. This study analyzes sections of rail alignment in both Los Angeles and San Bernardino Counties that could be double tracked to improve and expand Metrolink service. Safety enhancements along the line were also identified.

Work Elements

1. A Short Range Transit Plan (SRTP) will be created for the Transit and Rail department at SANBAG. The elements included will be funding projections for SANBAG's future rail projects, all six bus transit operators, Metrolink and the Consolidated Transportation Services Agency (CTSA). Additionally it will discuss service and future needs of all transit and rail in San Bernardino County. This SRTP is needed to submit as part of SANBAG's request to be Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Grantee's.
2. A security station study is being analyzed to see if there is an economic benefit to consolidate services associated with station security. Currently, each City is responsible for this at an individual level, as well as SANBAG is solely responsible for the Santa Fe Depot.
3. During Fiscal Year 2014/2015 the Rialto Metrolink Station will have completed property acquisition and begin construction to expand parking at this station.
4. Participate in the preliminary engineering and environmental clearance for the Gold Line extension from Azusa to Montclair.
5. On behalf of and funded by the City of Fontana, implement grade crossing safety improvements at Sierra Avenue and Juniper Avenue.
6. In conjunction with the City of Redlands, re-construct track and railroad signaling devices at Alabama Street and Colton Avenue grade crossings in conjunction the City's improvements.

7. Initiate Upland Metrolink Station Constraints analysis to determine possible transit oriented development opportunities as well as increased accessibility for both bus and rail service. The Upland Metrolink station is located in a central urban environment and there is potential for site specific development on property currently owned by SANBAG. This study will examine the feasibility of adding additional station platforms and access by Omnitrans bus service as well as the development potential of the SANBAG owned property.
8. Initiate San Bernardino County Metrolink station land use analysis and development feasibility study. The existing land uses surrounding the seven Metrolink commuter rail stations are underutilized and not conducive to transit oriented development. The purpose of the study will be to analyze what actions may be taken to support higher levels of residential, commercial and office development around the station areas to increase rail and transit ridership as well as generate economic development opportunities for the local jurisdictions.
9. Efforts to implement the Redlands Passenger Rail Project include commencement of final design, certification of the environmental document, initially efforts to acquire rolling stock, hiring a program management consultant, and efforts to assist the cities of Redlands and San Bernardino in implementing a programmatic environmental document for Transit Oriented Development around the proposed stations.

Financing required for SCRRA new capital projects has become increasingly difficult to obtain. The implementation of PTC together with budget short-falls has placed additional financial pressure on the five member agencies – SANBAG, LACMTA, Riverside County Transportation Commission (RCTC), Ventura County Transportation Commission (VCTC), and Orange County Transportation Authority (OCTA). SANBAG will continue to seek agreement with LACMTA for funding to construct additional capacity improvements on the San Bernardino line which may include the following. This capital expense task consists of five primary programs:

1. Funding for the implementation of PTC.
2. Funding for the SCRRA annual rehabilitation and renovation program (capital maintenance) for infrastructure, locomotives, and rolling stock.
3. Establishment of a rolling stock replacement fund.
4. Construction of the DSBPRP.
5. New potential capital projects on the San Gabriel Subdivision including sealed corridor improvements, double track, rail access to the Ontario and San Bernardino Airports, safety enhancements to grade crossings, and improved land use around Metrolink stations to promote transit oriented development.

The majority of funding for the above projects will be comprised of Federal funds with Measure I Valley Rail, Transportation Development Act funds, and State Bond Proceeds funds being the local match. Federal funds needed for specific SCRRA projects will be applied for by SCRRA and will not flow through the SANBAG Budget. Other Federal funds for the DSBPRP and RPRP will be included in the SANBAG budget. Historically SCRRA claimed all Federal Rail dollars on behalf of SANBAG; however in Fiscal Year 2014/2015 SANBAG is going to allocate some monies for current SANBAG rail projects. SCRRA is not proposing to do any capital projects that affect SANBAG for this budget year. Additionally, \$8.5 million is for rehabilitation work on the Redlands Rail line.

Background: Between 1991 and 1993, SANBAG acquired the Baldwin Park branch, the Pasadena Subdivision, and the Redlands branch line for its commuter rail program. Following the acquisition of these rail assets, in 1994, SANBAG contracted with the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (LACMTA) to provide property management services. The management services provided to SANBAG by LACMTA included: environmental due diligence work, management of leases, licenses and easements, ensuring that weed abatement and trash removal is handled, preparing agreements and licenses for utilities and street crossings of the right-of-way, and marketing surplus property. With expansion of Metrolink into downtown San Bernardino, addition of passenger rail service to Redlands, miscellaneous other projects along the right-of-way, and the increased

need to develop transit oriented land uses around station locations, it became necessary to expand and more closely manage the SANBAG railroad right-of-way. As a result of these needs, the SANBAG Board in September 2010 approved the release of a Request for Proposal for the selection of a Railroad Right-of-Way Property Management Consultant. In May 2011 the Board approved the award to Epic Land Solutions, Inc.

The contract was generally to be for on-call as-needed services to manage the railroad right-of-way and assets owned by SANBAG. The Scope of Work was divided into five tasks as follows:

- Task 1 – Evaluate and Organize Property Management Files
- Task 2 – Develop and Implement Property Management Procedures
- Task 3 – Manage and Maintain Property Services
- Task 4 – Identify and Dispose of Excess Property
- Task 5 – Other Services

During the procurement it was not known as to the extent of services by task that would be used. Now that staff is finishing up the third year of managing SANBAG's rail right-of-way, there is a better understanding of the day to day activities that are needed to continue proper management. Epic's original fee proposal was based on a calculation of 18 months of work spread over the three year term. SANBAG staff worked with Epic Land Solutions, Inc. to provide a proposal for another two years, based on the current work environment of rail owned right-of-way. This amendment includes increased monthly maintenance-of-way expenses and administration of license agreements. Additionally, once the SANBAG Board approves a Policy related to Rail right-of-way, which includes a Board approved fee schedule; Epic will see an increase in administration costs to begin license amendment with those who have had a no fee agreements. This will provide SANBAG with an increase in revenue which up until this time has not been applicable.

Financial Impact: This item is consistent with the FY 2013/14 budget, Task No. 377, Commuter Rail Operating.

Background: Between 1991 and 1993, San Bernardino Associated Governments (SANBAG) acquired the Baldwin Park branchline, the Pasadena Subdivision, and the Redlands branchline, and all railroad rights-of-way, for its commuter rail program. Following the acquisition of these rail assets, SANBAG in 1994 contracted with the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (LACMTA) to provide property management services. During 2011, SANBAG conducted a procurement to select its own consultant to provide these services followed by the termination of said services with LACMTA. On May 4, 2011, the Board awarded Contract No. C11206 to Epic Land Solutions for management services of SANBAG's rights-of-way.

Historically, the management services provided to SANBAG by the LACMTA have included: environmental due diligence, management of leases, licenses and easements, weed abatement and trash removal, preparing agreements and licenses for utilities and street crossings of the right-of-way, and marketing surplus property. To expedite the provision of these services, SANBAG provided LACMTA power-of-attorney to handle these matters on SANBAG's behalf. SANBAG's rail assets portfolio includes approximately one-thousand fifty (1,050) licenses, leases, and agreements that generate roughly \$400,000 in annual revenue. The revenues generated by SANBAG's rail assets are used to fund improvements related to the rail system. Examples of past projects include the restoration of the San Bernardino Depot, San Bernardino Parking Structure, and the restoration of the Upland Lemon Grower's Warehouse.

When SANBAG procured the right-of-way consultant services, SANBAG did not grant Epic Land Solutions, Inc. (Epic) power-of-attorney. Consequently, this Board action is required to authorize SANBAG to enter into or amend any new or existing license, lease, or agreement for the use of SANBAG's property.

The amendment to City of Rialto Agreement No. C09168, Bikeway License Agreement will grant requested changes to exhibit D-2 for fencing requirements. Originally, landscaping and fencing was prohibited within one hundred and fifty (150) feet of the centerline of any at-grade road crossings. However after plan review, staff agreed with the City's request to change the requirement to prohibit landscaping and fencing within 20 or 25 feet of the centerline of any at-grade road crossing depending on their approved plans.

The Bikeway License Agreement will be for an at grade use of the property between Grove Street and Wabash Avenue on SANBAG's rail right-of-way property in the City of Rialto, approximately 8,448 Lin. Ft (1.6 miles). The use of the property will be for construction, maintenance and use as a bikeway and pedestrian walkway along with associated landscaping and appurtenances and also provides for reservation of future rail implementation.

This agreement was originally executed by LACMTA in September 2009; with a term of 20 years. The license does allow SANBAG to terminate the license with thirty (30) days prior written notice.

Additionally, staff is requesting the Executive Director or his designee to enter into the necessary right-of-entry (ROE) permit or agreement with the contractor who has been awarded by the City of Rialto. The ROE will be reviewed by legal counsel prior to submitting to Executive Director.

It is necessary to refine the boiler-plate license agreements. Staff is currently working with general counsel to develop a policy governing future licenses, leases and agreements for SANBAG's rights-of-way and property. Options would likely include a range of options from continuing to present each new or amended agreement to the Board for action to the Board approving boilerplate documents and delegating authority to the Executive Director or his designee to execute them.

Financial Impact: Approval of this item will result in a one-time \$1,500 administration fee to Epic Land Solutions, Inc. by the City of Redlands.

All fees will be collected by Epic on behalf of SANBAG and retained in the SANBAG rail assets trust account until the funds are transmitted to SANBAG's finance department. The revenue may be budgeted in subsequent fiscal years for projects that benefit SANBAG's rail systems/assets.

This **FIRST AMENDMENT TO BIKEWAY LICENSE AGREEMENT** ("**Amendment**") is made and entered into by and between the **SAN BERNARDINO ASSOCIATED GOVERNMENTS**, acting in its capacity as the **SAN BERNARDINO COUNTY TRANSPORTATION AUTHORITY**, a public agency existing under the authority of the laws of the State of California ("**SANBAG**"), and the **CITY OF RIALTO** ("**Licensee**"), whereby the parties mutually agree to amend that certain Bikeway License Agreement between them dated March 1, 2009, SANBAG contract number C09168 and designated in SANBAG's railroad right of way files as RBPK 001888 (the "License"), as follows:

1. SANBAG's Address as set forth in paragraph 7 of the Basic License Provisions of the License is amended to read:

- Pruning of trees. During the first five years of establishment, trees shall receive at least annual pruning. All cuttings shall be disposed of off-site, the same day.
- Planting design and subsequent trimming plan shall incorporate compliance with existing regulations related to visibility and clearance for vehicles and pedestrians (including bus stop clearance requirements) and to maintain adequate visibility to existing advertising billboards.
- Tree trimming at bus stops shall meet requirements that no part of any tree shall extend beyond the curb line for the entire length of the red curb and that at the curb line, no part of any tree shall be lower than 13 feet above the street level.
- Maintenance levels shall be sufficient to not pose a fire hazard to all SANBAG buildings and structures, including poles and wirelines.

- Respond to emergency situations, including trimming for public safety and visibility of traffic devices, signs, etc.
- To facilitate railroad operations, the landscaping shall also be maintained so as to not:
 - (i) obstruct railroad signs and signals,
 - (ii) interfere with railroad employees performing their duties on the SANBAG Property,
 - (iii) prevent the proper functioning of signal and communication lines, or
 - (iv) railroad employees from visually inspecting moving equipment from their normal duty stations.
- Licensee shall maintain the northeasterly extent of any and all landscaping associated with the Bikeway and the License Property such that the same are at all times no closer than twenty (20) feet from the centerline of the nearest railroad track located northeasterly of the License Property.
- Fencing and landscaping associated with the Bikeway lying within twenty and twenty-five (20-25) feet of the centerline of any at-grade road crossing of SANBAG Property shall meet the following minimum requirements:
 - (i) landscaping shall be maintained to a height of not more than three (3) feet above surrounding ground level;
 - (ii) fencing shall be maintained to a height of not more than four (4) feet above surrounding ground level.”

3. Licensee shall pay the sum of One-Thousand Five-Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) to SANBAG as _____, such sum shall be payable _____.
4. In all other respects the License shall remain unmodified and in full force and effect.

that provide increased protection against security and safety threats, and for capital expenditures to increase the capacity of transit operators to develop disaster response transportation systems. The California Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES) administers such funds deposited in the Transit System Safety, Security and Disaster Response Account under the California Transit Security Grant Program (CTSGP) and California Transit Assistance Fund (CTAF).

Due to CTSGP requirements, Board approval of project and fiscal year-specific resolutions is required prior to submitting a grant application. To date, SANBAG has received \$1,459,313 to fund security improvements for the Downtown San Bernardino Passenger Rail Project (DSBPRP). In October 2013 and January 2014, the Board approved the submission of a subsequent grant application to fund DSBPRP security improvements and an application to fund a security study of the various Valley transit stations, respectively.

Following the finalization of the bids for the DSBPRP and San Bernardino Transit Center (SBTC), staff was able to determine with more certainty eligible security-related costs associated with both projects. Maximizing the use of the CTSGP funds allows SANBAG to save more flexible fund sources for other projects. With the award of Fiscal Year 2012/2013 and Fiscal Year 2013/2014 CTSGP funds, SANBAG would improve the physical security of the SBTC by installing lighting, fencing, and electronic security and safety systems, which will include security cameras and fire alarm systems. SANBAG would also improve the physical security of the tracks, rights of way, parking lots, and pedestrian pathways associated with the DSBPRP. SANBAG would use the funds to install/construct chain link and wrought iron fences, gates, and hand rails in addition to purchasing security and safety equipment.

The SBTC will serve as a transfer point for bus routes serving the Downtown area and provide connectivity between the sbX Bus Rapid Transit system, DSBPRP, and the future Redlands Passenger Rail Project. DSBPRP will include the extension of Metrolink regional passenger rail service approximately 1 mile east from its current terminus at the existing San Bernardino Metrolink Station/Santa Fe Depot to a new Metrolink commuter rail terminus at the intersection of Rialto Avenue and E Street in the City of San Bernardino.

Financial Impact: This item is consistent with the adopted SANBAG Fiscal Year 2013/2014 Budget. The CTSGP grant does not require matching funds.

Background: Between 1991 and 1993, San Bernardino Associated Governments (SANBAG) acquired the Baldwin Park branchline, the Pasadena Subdivision, and the Redlands branchline, and all railroad rights-of-way, for its commuter rail program. Following the acquisition of these rail assets, SANBAG in 1994 contracted with the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (LACMTA) to provide property management services. During 2011, SANBAG conducted a procurement to select its own consultant to provide these services followed by the termination of said services with LACMTA. On May 4, 2011, the Board awarded Contract No. C11206 to Epic Land Solutions for management services of SANBAG's rights-of-way.

Historically, the management services provided to SANBAG by the LACMTA have included: environmental due diligence, management of leases, licenses and easements, weed abatement and trash removal, preparing agreements and licenses for utilities and street crossings of the right-of-way, and marketing surplus property. To expedite the provision of these services, SANBAG provided LACMTA power-of-attorney to handle these matters on SANBAG's behalf. SANBAG's rail

assets portfolio includes approximately one-thousand fifty (1,050) licenses, leases, and agreements that generate roughly \$400,000 in annual revenue. The revenues generated by SANBAG's rail assets are used to fund improvements related to the rail system. Examples of past projects include the restoration of the San Bernardino Depot, San Bernardino Parking Structure, and the restoration of the Upland Lemon Grower's Warehouse.

When SANBAG procured the right-of-way consultant services, SANBAG did not grant Epic Land Solutions, Inc. (Epic) power-of-attorney. Consequently, this Board action is required to authorize SANBAG to enter into or amend any new or existing license, lease, or agreement for the use of SANBAG's property.

The City of San Bernardino currently has a license agreement with SANBAG for the Mount Vernon Avenue Bridge which crosses the SANBAG rail right-of-way. The right-of-entry grants the City of San Bernardino's contractor, GMZ Engineering, access to remove existing shoring and installation of replacement temporary shoring for the Mount Vernon Avenue overcrossing at the BNSF Yards. Details include replacing timber shoring footings with concrete. The parts effecting SANBAG rail right-of-way are bents 7 and 8.

It is necessary to refine the boiler-plate license agreements. Staff is currently working with general counsel to develop a policy governing future licenses, leases and agreements for SANBAG's rights-of-way and property. Options would likely include a range of options from continuing to present each new or amended agreement to the Board for action to the Board approving boilerplate documents and delegating authority to the Executive Director or his designee to execute them.

Financial Impact: Approval of this item will result in a one-time \$1,500 administration fee to Epic Land Solutions, Inc. by GMZ Engineering.

All fees will be collected by Epic on behalf of SANBAG and retained in the SANBAG rail assets trust account until the funds are transmitted to SANBAG's finance department. The revenue may be budgeted in subsequent fiscal years for projects that benefit SANBAG's rail systems/assets.
