Subject: Notice of Preparation of a Draft Environmental Impact Report/Environmental Assessment for the Redlands Passenger Rail Project

The San Bernardino Associated Governments (SANBAG) is the Lead Agency for the preparation of an Environmental Impact Report (EIR) in accordance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) for the Redlands Passenger Rail Project (RPRP or project). The EIR’s purpose is to identify the significant effects on the environment of a project, to identify alternatives to the project, and to indicate the manner in which those significant effects can be mitigated or avoided. The EIR addresses the environmental issues associated with the proposed Project. In accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), an Environmental Assessment (EA) will be prepared as a joint document with the EIR. The Federal Transit Administration (FTA) is the Lead Agency for the NEPA process.

The purpose of this Notice of Preparation (NOP) is to notify agencies, organizations, and individuals that SANBAG plans to prepare a Draft EIR and to request input on the environmental analysis to be performed. From public agencies, we are requesting comments on the scope and content of the environmental information, which is germane to each agency’s statutory responsibilities with regard to the project. We are also requesting interested individuals’ or organizations’ views on the scope of the environmental document.

No Initial Study Checklist has been prepared for the project. Based on a preliminary review of the project corridor and in consideration of the project activities, SANBAG has determined that potentially significant impacts may occur as a result of project implementation. In this instance, because the Lead Agency has decided to prepare an EIR, preparation of an Initial Study is not required by CEQA. SANBAG will prepare a Draft EIR as authorized by Section 15060(d) of the State CEQA Guidelines. The EA will be prepared in accordance with the Council on Environmental Quality Regulations (40 Code of Federal Regulations [CFR] 1500), Regulations for Implementing the Procedural Provisions of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), and the joint Federal Transit Administration (FTA)/Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) regulations (23 CFR 771), Environmental Impact and Related Procedures. In addition to the potentially significant impacts that were determined by SANBAG for the EIR, the EA will analyze the potential impacts related to acquisitions/displacements and environmental justice per the requirements of NEPA.

Project Location and Environmental Setting:

The project proposes to re-introduce passenger rail service along the existing railroad right-of-way (ROW) owned by SANBAG from the City of San Bernardino on the west to the City of Redlands on the east, in southwestern San Bernardino County, California (see Figure 1, Regional Map). This right-of-way is commonly referred to as the “Redland Branch Line” and is also commonly referred to as the “Redlands Subdivision, Redlands Spur, or Redlands Corridor.” The entire Redlands Corridor is an approximately ten mile rail segment that extends from the

Santa Fe Depot in the City of San Bernardino to the University of Redlands in the City of Redlands. As a part of this project, most of the existing railroad infrastructure would be reconstructed as described in more detail below. The Project Study Area for the RPRP extends from E Street in the City of San Bernardino to Cook Street in the City of Redlands. This linear corridor area will be evaluated in the EIR/EA and is generally limited to the existing railroad ROW and, in limited instances, areas immediately adjacent (e.g. generally less than 200-feet from the rail ROW).

Project Description:

The Project would include the development of new railroad infrastructure along an approximate nine-mile section of rail corridor owned by SANBAG and part of the former Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe (now the Burlington Northern Santa Fe Railway (BNSF)) Railroad's Redlands Subdivision. SANBAG purchased this piece of the railroad along with others in the County from the BNSF in 1993 along with other agencies in Southern California and as a part of the divestiture of the physical assets of the BNSF. The Project would include the development of four new stations consisting of boarding platforms with supporting amenities, parking, and pedestrian access improvements. The Project would include a new train layover/storage facility with storage tracks, a vehicle wash, a 10,000 square foot building, and ancillary facilities. Track upgrades would include signal improvements, replacement or retrofit of four existing bridge structures, and approximately 28 at-grade highway-rail crossings. Some existing at-grade highway rail crossings may be closed (blocked off) as a part of the Project. The Project would also involve culvert replacements and extensions, utility replacements and relocations, and implementation of safety warning devices. Passenger rail service would occur from five stations located at E Street and Tippecanoe Avenue in the City of San Bernardino and New York Street, Orange Street (Downtown Redlands), and University Street (University of Redlands) in the City of Redlands. The station platforms at E Street would be constructed as part of a separate project that would extend Metrolink service east from the Santa Fe Depot.

The Project alternatives would be constructed within the corridor identified in Figure 2, RPRP Study Area. SANBAG proposes the construction of a single track with a one-mile long passing siding located near the midpoint of the alignment. Project components would include the following with construction planned to start in 2015:

- Track Improvements. Proposed track improvements include a redesign of the existing single track alignment and track ballast and subgrade foundation from E Street in San Bernardino to Cook Street in Redlands. Existing rail and railroad ties will be salvaged as part of the Project.
- E Street, Tippecanoe Avenue, New York Street, Downtown Redlands, and University of Redlands Rail Stations. The proposed rail stations will include the installation of new station boarding platforms (with the exception of the E Street Station), ticket vending machines, a shade canopy with some seating, accessible walkways to the public right of way or parking area, lighting, and parking area(s).
- Grade Crossings. Twenty-eight (28) existing highway-rail at-grade crossings and two (2) existing grade separated crossings are within the limits of the project and may be modified to improve and update the safety warning systems at each crossing. Some crossings may be closed to improve roadway related safety associated with the project. The two existing grade separated crossings of Interstate Route 10 will remain.
- Parcel Acquisitions and Relocations. Acquisition of additional right-of-way is required. At this time, SANBAG is not certain on the number of affected parcels as the project is currently in preliminary design phases. In some instances, the acquired parcels may contain active businesses requiring relocation.
- Culvert Replacements, Extensions, and Relocations. Drainage facilities along the rail corridor, such as culverts that extend under the existing railroad track, will require replacement, extension, or relocation. New culverts may be added to improve drainage across (under) the rail corridor.
- Utility Replacement and Relocation. Storm drains, sewer lines, water lines, under drains, railroad signal houses, street lights, power poles and conductors, telephone and/or fiber optic communications lines, commercial billboards, and an oil line will require replacement, relocation, or extension.
- Traffic and Rail Signals. Additional rail and traffic signals will be installed for the corridor based on the final project design. The new passenger rail system will operate under Automatic or Centralized Traffic Control (ATC or CTC) with a single passing siding. A new communications fiber optic backbone communications line will be constructed within the railroad corridor.

- Rail Operations. An operating plan has been developed using Rail Traffic Controller (RTC) modeling and operational analysis based on input from SANBAG, Metrolink, and BNSF. Operations are projected to commence in 2018. Passenger rail service would utilize previously owned rail vehicles consisting of a single trainset composed of one locomotive and up to two cars (see Figure 3, Train Consist).
- Maintenance. Typical railroad maintenance will be required during the operational phase of the project and would be completed from a centralized layover facility proposed to the west of California Street; immediately south of I-10.

Alternatives:

The EIR/EA will include consideration of alternatives to the Project consistent with the requirements of CEQA and NEPA. At this time, SANBAG anticipates that this may include the consideration of a No Project/Action Alternative and an Alternative Layover Facility Location. Other build alternatives may also be considered.

Potential Environmental Effects of the Project:

The potential environmental effects of the project include, but are not limited to, the following: aesthetics, air quality/greenhouse gases, biological resources, cultural resources, hazards and hazardous materials, hydrology and water quality, land use and planning, noise, acquisitions/displacements, environmental justice, and transportation/circulation. These topics will be analyzed in the EIR/EA.

Scoping Meeting:

The NOP 30-day public review period for this project begins on April 10, 2012 and ends on May 12, 2012. Two scoping meetings are scheduled to occur during the course of the 30-day NOP public review period. These meetings will be held at the following locations located along the RPRP Study Area:

This NOP is being circulated pursuant to California Public Resource Code Section 21153(a) and the State CEQA Guidelines, Section 15082. Public agencies and the public are invited to comment on the proposed scope and content of the environmental information to be included in the EIR/EA. A 30-day comment period is provided to return written comments to SANBAG. Written responses and comments will be accepted until May 12, 2012. 




Regional Location and Project Area

SANBAG/FTA | Redlands Passenger Rail Project | NOP




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

Dear Ms. Peterson:

The Native American Heritage Commission (NAHC), the State of California 'Trustee Agency' for the protection and preservation of Native American cultural resources pursuant to California Public Resources Code §21070 and affirmed by the Third Appellate Court in the case of EPIC v. Johnson (1985: 170 Cal App. 3rd 604).

This letter includes state and federal statutes relating to Native American historic properties of religious and cultural significance to American Indian tribes and interested Native American individuals as 'consulting parties' under both state and federal law. State law also addresses the freedom of Native American Religious Expression in Public Resources Code §5097.9.

The California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA – CA Public Resources Code 21000-21177, amendments effective 3/18/2010) requires that any project that causes a substantial adverse change in the significance of an historical resource, that includes archaeological resources, is a 'significant effect' requiring the preparation of an Environmental Impact Report (EIR) per the CEQA Guidelines defines a significant impact on the environment as 'a substantial, or potentially substantial, adverse change in any of physical conditions within an area affected by the proposed project, including ... objects of historic or aesthetic significance.' In order to comply with this provision, the lead agency is required to assess whether the project will have an adverse impact on these resources within the 'area of potential effect (APE), and if so, to mitigate that effect. The NAHC Sacred Lands File (SLF) search resulted as follows: No Native American Cultural Resources were not identified within the 'area of potential effect (APE).

The NAHC "Sacred Sites," as defined by the Native American Heritage Commission and the California Legislature in California Public Resources Code §§5097.94(a) and 5097.96. Items in the NAHC Sacred Lands Inventory are confidential and exempt from the Public Records Act pursuant to California Government Code §6254 (r).

Early consultation with Native American tribes in your area is the best way to avoid unanticipated discoveries of cultural resources or burial sites once a project is underway. Culturally affiliated tribes and individuals may have knowledge of the religious and cultural significance of the historic properties in the project area (e.g. APE). We strongly urge that you make contact with the list of Native American Contacts on the attached list of Native American

contacts, to see if your proposed project might impact Native American cultural resources and to obtain their recommendations concerning the proposed project. Pursuant to CA Public Resources Code § 5097.95, the NAHC requests cooperation from other public agencies in order that the Native American consulting parties be provided pertinent project information. Consultation with Native American communities is also a matter of environmental justice as defined by California Government Code §65040.12(e). Pursuant to CA Public Resources Code §5097.95, the NAHC requests that pertinent project information be provided consulting tribal parties. The NAHC recommends *avoidance* as defined by CEQA Guidelines §15370(a) to pursuing a project that would damage or destroy Native American cultural resources and Section 2183.2 that requires documentation, data recovery of cultural resources.

Furthermore, the NAHC if the proposed project is under the jurisdiction of the statutes and regulations of the National Environmental Policy Act (e.g. NEPA; 42 U.S.C. 4321-43351). Consultation with tribes and interested Native American consulting parties, on the NAHC list, should be conducted in compliance with the requirements of federal NEPA and Section 106 and 4(f) of federal NHPA (16 U.S.C. 470 *et seq*), 36 CFR Part 800.3 (f) (2) & .5, the President's Council on Environmental Quality (CSQ, 42 U.S.C 4371 *et seq.* and NAGPRA (25 U.S.C. 3001-3013) as appropriate. The 1992 *Secretary of the Interiors Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties* were revised so that they could be applied to all historic resource types included in the National Register of Historic Places and including cultural landscapes. Also, federal Executive Orders Nos. 11593 (preservation of cultural environment), 13175 (coordination & consultation) and 13007 (Sacred Sites) are helpful, supportive guides for Section 106 consultation. The aforementioned Secretary of the Interior's *Standards* include recommendations for all 'lead agencies' to consider the historic context of proposed projects and to "research" the cultural landscape that might include the 'area of potential effect.'

Confidentiality of "historic properties of religious and cultural significance" should also be considered as protected by California Government Code §6254(r) and may also be protected under Section 304 of the NHPA or at the Secretary of the Interior discretion if not eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places. The Secretary may also be advised by the federal Indian Religious Freedom Act (cf. 42 U.S.C., 1996) in issuing a decision on whether or not to disclose items of religious and/or cultural significance identified in or near the APEs and possibility threatened by proposed project activity.


Furthermore, Public Resources Code Section 5097.98, California Government Code §27491 and Health & Safety Code Section 7050.5 provide for provisions for inadvertent discovery of human remains mandate the processes to be followed in the event of a discovery of human remains in a project location other than a 'dedicated cemetery'.

To be effective, consultation on specific projects must be the result of an ongoing relationship between Native American tribes and lead agencies, project proponents and their contractors, in the opinion of the NAHC. Regarding tribal consultation, a relationship built around regular meetings and informal involvement with local tribes will lead to more qualitative consultation tribal input on specific projects.

Finally, when Native American cultural sites and/or Native American burial sites are prevalent within the project site, the NAHC recommends 'avoidance' of the site as referenced by CEQA Guidelines Section 15370(a).



The Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC) has received your submitted Revised Notice of Preparation for a Draft Environmental Impact Report (EIR) for the above-mentioned project. The following project description is stated in your document: "The project proposes to re-introduce passenger rail service along the existing railroad right-of-way (ROW) owned by SANBAG from the City of San Bernardino on the west to the City of Redland on the east, in southwestern San Bernardino County, California. This right-of-way is commonly referred to as the "Redland Branch Line" and is also commonly referred to as "Redlands Subdivision, Redland Spur, or Redlands Corridor." The entire Redlands Corridor is approximately ten mile rail segment that extends from the Santa Fe Depot in the City of San Bernardino to the University of Redlands in the City of Redlands. The Project would include the development of new railroad infrastructure along an approximate nine-mile section of rail corridor owned by SANBAG and part of the former Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe (now the Burlington Northern Santa Fe Railway (BNSF)) Railroad's Redlands Subdivision."

Based on the review of the submitted document DTSC has the following comments:

- 1) The EIR should evaluate whether conditions within the Project area may pose a threat to human health or the environment. Following are the databases of some of the regulatory agencies:
 - National Priorities List (NPL): A list maintained by the United States Environmental Protection Agency (U.S.EPA).

 - Solid Waste Information System (SWIS): A database provided by the California Integrated Waste Management Board which consists of both open as well as closed and inactive solid waste disposal facilities and transfer stations.

 - Local Counties and Cities maintain lists for hazardous substances cleanup sites and leaking underground storage tanks.
 - The United States Army Corps of Engineers, 911 Wilshire Boulevard, Los Angeles, California, 90017, (213) 452-3908, maintains a list of Formerly Used Defense Sites (FUDS).
- 2) The EIR should identify the mechanism to initiate any required investigation and/or remediation for any site within the proposed Project area that may be contaminated, and the government agency to provide appropriate regulatory oversight. If necessary, DTSC would require an oversight agreement in order to review such documents.
- 3) Any environmental investigations, sampling and/or remediation for a site should be conducted under a Workplan approved and overseen by a regulatory agency that has jurisdiction to oversee hazardous substance cleanup. The findings of any investigations, including any Phase I or II Environmental Site Assessment Investigations should be summarized in the document. All sampling results in which hazardous substances were found above regulatory standards should be clearly summarized in a table. All closure, certification or remediation approval reports by regulatory agencies should be included in the EIR.


- 4) If buildings, other structures, asphalt or concrete-paved surface areas are being planned to be demolished, an investigation should also be conducted for the presence of other hazardous chemicals, mercury, and asbestos containing materials (ACMs). If other hazardous chemicals, lead-based paints (LPB) or products, mercury or ACMs are identified, proper precautions should be taken during demolition activities. Additionally, the contaminants should be remediated in compliance with California environmental regulations and policies.
- 5) Future project construction may require soil excavation or filling in certain areas. Sampling may be required. If soil is contaminated, it must be properly disposed and not simply placed in another location onsite. Land Disposal Restrictions (LDRs) may be applicable to such soils. Also, if the project proposes to import soil to backfill the areas excavated, sampling should be conducted to ensure that the imported soil is free of contamination.
- 6) Human health and the environment of sensitive receptors should be protected during any construction or demolition activities. If necessary, a health risk assessment overseen and approved by the appropriate government agency should be conducted by a qualified health risk assessor to determine if there are, have been, or will be, any releases of hazardous materials that may pose a risk to human health or the environment.
- 7) If the site was used for agricultural, livestock or related activities, onsite soils and groundwater might contain pesticides, agricultural chemical, organic waste or other related residue. Proper investigation, and remedial actions, if necessary, should be conducted under the oversight of and approved by a government agency at the site prior to construction of the project.
- 8) If it is determined that hazardous wastes are, or will be, generated by the proposed operations, the wastes must be managed in accordance with the California Hazardous Waste Control Law (California Health and Safety Code, Division 20, Chapter 6.5) and the Hazardous Waste Control Regulations (California Code of Regulations, Title 22, Division 4.5). If it is determined that hazardous wastes will be generated, the facility should also obtain a United States Environmental Protection Agency Identification Number by contacting (800) 618-6942. Certain hazardous waste treatment processes or hazardous materials, handling, storage or uses may require authorization from the local Certified Unified Program Agency (CUPA). Information about the requirement for authorization can be obtained by contacting your local CUPA.
- 9) DTSC can provide cleanup oversight through an Environmental Oversight Agreement (EOA) for government agencies that are not responsible parties, or a Voluntary Cleanup Agreement (VCA) for private parties. For additional information on the EOA or VCA, please see

Notice of Preparation of a CEQA Document for the Redlands Passenger Rail Project

The South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD) appreciates the opportunity to comment on the above-mentioned document. The SCAQMD's comments are recommendations regarding the analysis of potential air quality impacts from the proposed project that should be included in the draft CEQA document. Please send the SCAQMD a copy of the Draft EIR upon its completion. Note that copies of the Draft EIR that are submitted to the State Clearinghouse are not forwarded to the SCAQMD. Please forward a copy of the Draft EIR directly to SCAQMD at the address in our letterhead. **In addition, please send with the draft EIR all appendices or technical documents related to the air quality and greenhouse gas analyses and electronic versions of all air quality modeling and health risk assessment files. These include original emission calculation spreadsheets and modeling files (not Adobe PDF files). Without all files and supporting air quality documentation, the SCAQMD will be unable to complete its review of the air quality analysis in a timely manner. Any delays in providing all supporting air quality documentation will require additional time for review beyond the end of the comment period.**

Air Quality Analysis

The SCAQMD adopted its California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Air Quality Handbook in 1993 to assist other public agencies with the preparation of air quality analyses. The SCAQMD recommends that the Lead Agency use this Handbook as guidance when preparing its air quality analysis. Copies of the Handbook are available from the SCAQMD's Subscription Services Department by calling (909) 396-3720. The lead agency may wish to consider using land use emissions estimating software such as the recently released CalEEMod. This model is available on the SCAQMD Website at: <http://www.aqmd.gov/ceqa/models.html>.

The Lead Agency should identify any potential adverse air quality impacts that could occur from all phases of the project and all air pollutant sources related to the project. Air quality impacts from both construction (including demolition, if any) and operations should be calculated. Construction-related air quality impacts typically include, but are not limited to, emissions from the use of heavy-duty equipment from grading, earth-loading/unloading, paving, architectural coatings, off-road mobile sources (e.g., heavy-duty construction equipment) and on-road mobile sources (e.g., construction worker vehicle trips, material transport trips). Operation-related air quality impacts may include, but are not limited to, emissions from stationary sources (e.g., boilers), area sources (e.g., solvents and coatings), and vehicular trips (e.g., on- and off-road tailpipe emissions and entrained dust). Air quality impacts from indirect sources, that is, sources that generate or attract vehicular trips should be included in the analysis.

The SCAQMD has developed a methodology for calculating PM_{2.5} emissions from construction and operational activities and processes. In connection with developing PM_{2.5} calculation methodologies, the SCAQMD has also developed both regional and localized significance thresholds. The SCAQMD requests that the lead agency quantify PM_{2.5} emissions and compare the results to the recommended PM_{2.5} significance thresholds. Guidance for calculating PM_{2.5} emissions and PM_{2.5} significance thresholds can be found at the following internet address: http://www.aqmd.gov/ceqa/handbook/PM2_5/PM2_5.html.

In addition to analyzing regional air quality impacts the SCAQMD recommends calculating localized air quality impacts and comparing the results to localized significance thresholds (LSTs). LST's can be used in addition to the recommended regional significance thresholds as a second indication of air quality impacts when preparing a CEQA document. Therefore, when preparing the air quality analysis for the proposed project, it is recommended that the lead agency perform a localized significance analysis by either using the LSTs developed by the SCAQMD or performing dispersion modeling as necessary. Guidance for performing a localized air quality analysis can be found at <http://www.aqmd.gov/ceqa/handbook/LST/LST.html>.

In the event that the proposed project generates or attracts vehicular trips, especially heavy-duty diesel-fueled vehicles, it is recommended that the lead agency perform a mobile source health risk assessment. Guidance for performing a mobile source health risk assessment ("Health Risk Assessment Guidance for Analyzing Cancer Risk from Mobile Source Diesel Idling Emissions for CEQA Air Quality Analysis") can be found on the SCAQMD's CEQA web pages at the following internet address: http://www.aqmd.gov/ceqa/handbook/mobile_toxic/mobile_toxic.html. An analysis of all toxic air contaminant impacts due to the decommissioning or use of equipment potentially generating such air pollutants should also be included.

Mitigation Measures


In the event that the project generates significant adverse air quality impacts, CEQA requires that all feasible mitigation measures that go beyond what is required by law be utilized during project construction and operation to minimize or eliminate significant adverse air quality impacts. To assist the Lead Agency with identifying possible mitigation measures for the project, please refer to Chapter 11 of the SCAQMD CEQA Air Quality Handbook for sample air quality mitigation measures. Additional mitigation measures can be found on the SCAQMD's CEQA web pages at the following internet address: www.aqmd.gov/ceqa/handbook/mitigation/MM_intro.html Additionally, SCAQMD's Rule 403 – Fugitive Dust, and the Implementation Handbook contain numerous measures for controlling construction-related emissions that should be considered for use as CEQA mitigation if not otherwise required. Other measures to reduce air quality impacts from land use projects can be found in the SCAQMD's Guidance Document for Addressing Air Quality Issues in General Plans and Local Planning. 

Thank you for submitting the **Notice of Preparation of a Draft Environmental Impact Report for the Redlands Passenger Rail Project [I20120071]** to the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) for review and comment. **COMMENTS ON THE NOTICE OF PREPARATION OF A DRAFT ENVIRONMENTAL
IMPACT REPORT FOR THE REDLANDS PASSENGER RAIL PROJECT [I20120071]**

PROJECT LOCATION

The proposed project is located along an existing railroad right-of-way owned by SANBAG from the City of San Bernardino on the west to the City of Redlands on the east, in southwestern San Bernardino County, California. The entire Redlands Corridor is an approximately ten mile rail segment that extends from Santa Fe Depot in the City of San Bernardino to the University of Redlands in the City of Redlands.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The proposed project would include the development of new railroad infrastructure along an approximate nine-mile section of rail corridor owned by SANBAG and part of the former Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe (now the Burlington Northern Santa Fe Railway (BNSF)) Railroad's Redlands Subdivision. SANBAG purchased this piece of the railroad along with others in the County from the BNSF in 1993 along with other agencies in Southern California and as part of the divestiture of the physical assets of the BNSF. The project would include the development of four new stations consisting of boarding platforms with supporting amenities, parking, and pedestrian access improvements. The project would include a new train layover/storage facility with storage tracks, a vehicle wash, a 10,000 square foot building, and ancillary facilities. Track upgrades would include signal improvements, replacement or retrofit of four existing bridge structures, and approximately 28 at-grade highway-rail crossings. Some existing at-grade highway rail crossings may be closed (blocked off) as part of the project. The project would also involve culvert replacements and extensions, utility replacements and relocations, and implementation of safety warning devices. Passenger rail service would occur from five stations located at E Street would be constructed as part of a separate project that would extend Metrolink service east from Santa Fe Depot.

This letter is a formal response to the Notice of Preparation for the Redlands Passenger Rail Project. Please see below environmental impact concerns for Catalina Garden Apartments (34 - 2 bedroom apartments) and Catalina Court Apartments (3 two bedroom apartments and one three bedroom single family residence). **Catalina Garden Apartments are less than 200-feet from the proposed passenger rail.**

Noise – Diesel Engines

It is our understanding from the scoping meetings that the passenger rail would run by diesel engines running every ½ hour each way. Noise from the diesel engines would have a negative impact on resident's living standards.

Noise – Crossing Bells

Noise from the crossing bells would also have a negative impact on resident's living standards.

Vibration

Vibration from the diesel engines and cars would have a negative impact on resident's living standards.

Air Quality

Diesel exhaust would have a negative impact on resident's living standards.

Traffic and Circulation - Congestion

University Street is a very busy main thoroughfare. The West bound “on ramp” to the 10 freeway and the East bound “off ramp” is located on University Street within a ¼ mile of the proposed passenger rail crossing. Because of these “on” and “off” ramps to the 10 freeway University Street and other streets that “spill” on to University Street experience heavy traffic. The University of Redlands and Redlands High School is also accessed by University Street further adding to this daily heavy traffic. Students that attend The University of Redlands and Redlands High School walk and ride bicycles and cross the proposed passenger rail crossing. The passenger rail would greatly add to the already heavy traffic congestion that exists. Residents of Catalina Garden Apartments, freeway commuters, surrounding neighbors, University of Redlands students and Redlands High School students would be negatively impacted by the further congestion the proposed passenger rail and rail crossing on University Street would create.

Traffic and Circulation – Dangerous Environment

Many Residents of Catalina Garden Apartments are students of the University of Redlands. Many of these students walk and ride their bicycle’s to the school campus and would encounter a dangerous environment with the coming and going of the passenger rail.

Parks and Recreational Facilities – Accessing Sylvan Park

Residents of Catalina Garden Apartments and residents of the City of Redlands would be negatively affected by the passenger rail when trying to access Sylvan Park.

Parks and Recreational Facilities – Dangerous Environment

Residents of Catalina Garden Apartments and other people visiting Sylvan Park would encounter a more dangerous environment with passenger rail cars running every ½ hour within 100 feet of Sylvan Park. Sylvan Park is the primary community park in the City of Redlands, Sylvan park draws hundreds of people, families and children for different functions throughout the year.

Parks and Recreational Facilities – Noise

Sylvan Park would be adversely affected by the noise created by the passenger rails diesel engines, rail cars and crossing bells.

I would like to thank you in advance for your careful consideration of these negative environmental impacts on Catalina Garden Apartments, Catalina Court, Sylvan Park and the surrounding neighborhood as a result of the proposed passenger rail.

Thank you for providing Omnitrans the opportunity to offer comments with respect to the preparation of an EIR/EA for the Redlands Passenger Rail Project. As the primary public transportation provider in the San Bernardino Valley serving fifteen cities and county areas within the San Bernardino Valley, Omnitrans (passengers and transit services) will be highly impacted by the Redlands Passenger Rail Project.

The January 2012 Financial Analysis Technical Memorandum produced for SANBAG's *Omnitrans Comprehensive Operational Assessment* states, "As a result of the Redlands Passenger Rail Project and other transit programs within the region and uncertainty in future State and federal funding levels, estimated annual revenue levels for Omnitrans are projected to decrease by approximately 12 percent over the next three years." According to the Technical Memorandum, Omnitrans' allocation of LTF operating revenues in Fiscal Year 2015 is projected to be twenty percent (20%) lower than Fiscal Year 2012.

Thus, a thorough analysis is needed of all projected financial impacts of the Redlands Passenger Rail Project on Omnitrans' operations. Also, due to the projected impacts of the Redlands Passenger Rail Project on operating revenues and service provision, it is critical that all appropriate Title VI and Environmental Justice analysis is conducted in compliance with federal regulations and FTA guidance. The analysis is needed to determine whether proposed changes to rail and bus service related to this project will have a disproportionate or discriminatory impact, as well as to ensure an equitable distribution of resources.

Additional analysis that is needed to prevent negative impacts on transportation-disadvantaged populations is an evaluation of non-motorized circulation and mobility along the passenger rail corridor. This includes pedestrian safety and access at grade crossings as well as pedestrian and bicycle access to stations along the Redlands Passenger Rail corridor.

As an impacted agency, Omnitrans requests to be added to the notification/ mailing list for impacted parties for the Redlands Passenger Rail Project. In order to be able to provide



Dear Mr. Alderman,

The University of Redlands is a supporter and participant in the Redlands Passenger Rail Project. The last station location within Redlands is at the University of Redlands. The University of Redlands is located north of the proposed station and it also owns lands surrounding the proposed "University Station" location. Based upon this unique situation the University wants to ensure that the project addresses potential environmental impacts associated with the project and fully evaluates reasonable alternatives and potential mitigation measures for the project.

The University is concerned with the impacts that will occur from the rail operations. Our understanding is that the passenger rail service would utilize previously owned rail vehicles consisting of a single trainset composed of one locomotive and up to two cars. The University has existing educational and theatrical performance facilities located directly north of the proposed transit station which will be negatively impacted by noise, vibration, and air pollution caused from the rail service. It is important, therefore, that the level of these impacts be identified, evaluated, and minimized to the full extent feasible. It had been indicated in earlier discussions with the University of Redlands that the SCAQMD might participate in developing a locomotive that would result in less noise and vibration as well as reducing air quality impacts. The University would like this alternative and/or other alternative equipment evaluated as one way to minimize noise, vibration, and air quality impacts. In addition to consideration of alternative equipment, we would want to ensure that if refurbished Metrolink equipment is utilized that the equipment is modified and/or equipped so as to minimize noise, vibration and air quality impacts to the greatest extent feasible.

Another noise concern that relates to typical rail operations is the blowing of horns at street crossings. This operational component of rail service is of particular concern as it pertains to the crossing at University Street which is adjacent to the campus. The horn blowing will be disruptive to educational classes and theatrical performances located in the buildings located


just northeast of University Street. We would like SANBAG, as a part of this project, to evaluate designing the crossing at University Street so that "horn blowing" is not needed. The University is familiar with other railroad crossings in the area that are designed so that horn blowing is not needed. Developing a non-horn blowing railroad crossing at University Street will be a significant noise mitigation factor for this project.

The southern portion of the University of Redlands Campus and the proposed station location to the east of University Street is within a floodplain. The City of Redlands is currently proceeding on a project to build a detention basin (Opal Basin) within Mentone, east of the station site, which will significantly reduce potential flooding to the site. It may be feasible to incorporate other elements into the flood control system (such as making improvements to the Zanja Creek, developing additional detention basins, and/or putting in storm drain links) that will eliminate or significantly reduce floodplain issues from the University Station site. Flooding is a significant impact for the development of the station that should be evaluated. Flooding potential will also have a significant impact on the proposed Transit Oriented Development planned in proximity to the station. It is recommended that as a part of the project flood control alternatives be evaluated so as to mitigate impacts to the project.

The project includes track replacement, grade crossing improvements, traffic and rail signals, and development of transit stations. Some of these improvements will be constructed directly adjacent to the campus. Construction impacts should be evaluated and mitigated. The impacts to be considered for review and mitigation should include increased traffic, noise, vibration, dust, and air quality.

We appreciate the opportunity to provide comments, concerns and recommendations with regards to the impacts of the Redlands Rail Project. If you need further clarification regarding the issues we have raised, please let us know. We look forward to actively participating in the EIR/EA process.

The Southern California Regional Rail Authority (SCRRA) has received the NOP of Draft EIR/Environmental Assessment for the Redlands passenger rail project. Thank you for the opportunity to comment on key issues relative to SCRRA and operations of the railroad adjacent or on the project site. As you are aware, SCRRA is a five-county Joint Powers Authority (JPA) that operates the regional commuter rail system known as Metrolink. Additionally, SCRRA provides rail engineering, construction, operations and maintenance services to its five JPA member agencies. The JPA consists of San Bernardino Associated Governments (SANBAG), the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (METRO), Orange County Transportation Authority (OCTA), Riverside County Transportation Commission (RCTC) and Ventura County Transportation Commission (VCTC).

The railroad right of way for your project is currently operated and maintained by the Burlington Northern Santa Fe Railway Co. (BNSF). The proposed project is also located in the cities of San Bernardino and Redlands and involves upgrades to about 28 railroad crossings.

Below is a list of general comments that are of concern for all proposed projects near or adjacent to the railroad right of way based on our initial cursory review of the NOP and its possible impact on the railroad. Please note that these are initial general comments submitted to meet the public comment period. SCRRA may follow up with more specific comments for consideration if further analysis deems it necessary.

Yes	<p>Design and Build to SCRRA Standards SCRRA will need to review and approve all drafts and final designs related to rail design to ensure conformance to design standards and operational needs.</p>
Yes	<p>SCRRA Involvement City/Agency shall provide timely notice, in accordance with Public Resources Code Section 21092.5 and State CEQA Guideline Section 15088, of the written proposed responses to our comments on this environmental document and the time and place of any scheduled public meetings or public hearings by the agency decision makers at least 10 days prior to such a meeting.</p>

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has reviewed the Notice of Preparation published April 10, 2012, requesting comments on the scope and content of Draft Environmental Impact Report/Environmental Assessment (DEIR/EA) to be performed by the San Bernardino Associated Governments (SANBAG) and Federal Transit Administration (FTA) for the proposed Redlands Passenger Rail Project connecting the City of San Bernardino to the City of Redlands. Our attached comments are provided pursuant to the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), Council on Environmental Quality (CEQ) regulations (40 CFR Parts 1500-1508) and Section 309 of the Clean Air Act.


EPA understands that at the completion of the Environmental Assessment process FTA may conclude with a "Finding of No Significance (FONSI)" pursuant to NEPA or, alternatively, initiate the development of an Environmental Impact Statement. Should FTA decide to sign a FONSI, we recommend a clear, comprehensive summary of all project commitments, including design, construction, and operation measures that will be implemented so that no significant impacts will result. Through the attached detailed comments, EPA has provided recommended measures to reduce the environmental impacts of the project.

EPA appreciates the opportunity to comment on rail and transit projects that can play a part in curtailing air quality impacts in one of our Region's counties in non-attainment. Our detailed comments below include recommendations relating to (1) Alternatives, (2) Phasing, (3) sustainability, (4) community coordination, (5) at-grade crossings, (6) air quality, (7)

maintenance and the Layover facility, (8) Land Use and Station Design, and (9) the relationship of this Project to other regional transportation projects.

EPA has reviewed the April 24, 2012 National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) EA and California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) EIR scoping presentation prepared by San Bernardino Association of Governments (SANBAG) for the proposed Redlands Passenger Rail Project (RPRP) (http://www.sanbag.ca.gov/projects/redlands-sb-rail/Scoping_Presentation_04-24-2012.pdf). We recommend that the DEIR/EA incorporate all the presented topic areas in the development of the DEIR/EA, and we provide the following additional recommendations.

Alternatives

The DEIR/EA should include a brief discussion of alternatives analysis already completed by SANBAG and Federal Transit Administration (FTA), including justification for why alternative solutions were not carried forward for further analysis and consideration. This discussion should include Bus Rapid Transit (BRT), light rail, Diesel Multiple Unit, and Metrolink extension, for example.

- Bus Rapid Transit - A successful nearby example of mixing a physically separated bike path with BRT on a rail right-of-way is Los Angeles Metro's Orange Line in San Fernando Valley. EPA recommends that SANBAG and FTA include BRT as an alternative analyzed in the DEIR/EA. A side-by-side analysis of this option, as compared to the proposed project in the DEIR/EA will be helpful for decision-makers to identify differences related to cost, environmental impacts, and ridership.
- Light Rail – An electrified light rail would result in reduced localized diesel emissions near the project site and reduced diesel emission-related health impacts. In the DEIR/EA, describe the rationale behind removing this option from further consideration, or include it as an alternative fully analyzed in the document.

Phasing

SANBAG and FTA should discuss the proposed RPRP in the context of SANBAG's overall plan for rail in this area. In particular, the May 11, 2012 presentation (http://sanbag.ca.gov/projects/redlands-sb-rail/Redland-Rail-PPT_05-11-12.pdf) identifies a larger future proposed project, including a City of Highlands loop, a San Bernardino Airport connection, and many more stations. How does the proposed RPRP relate to the larger project regarding timing for construction and operation, and connectivity to the larger transportation network? If the proposed RPRP is a stand-alone project, then how do the other elements relate? The other actions appear to be reasonably foreseeable future actions and connected actions to this project; therefore we would expect them to be analyzed and explained fully in this document. Optimally, the entire project would be analyzed together rather than segmented into separate environmental assessments. If SANBAG and FTA decide not to pursue one programmatic analysis, the cumulative impacts section should be comprehensive enough to understand the impacts of the project at complete build-out.

Community Coordination

EPA commends SANBAG and FTA for inviting early comment from potentially affected communities, and committing to using the NEPA process as a forum for the assessment of potential environmental justice impacts and the analysis of potential impacts related to land acquisition and displacement of residents. EPA encourages SANBAG and FTA to engage the broader community, not limited to the immediate right-of-way (ROW) and its borders, in effective participation in the NEPA process to better address public concerns during the planning process.

Recommendations:

- Engage community participation for concerns like environmental justice, air quality, toxics, intermodal connections, traffic circulation, noise, community connectivity, and other topics members of the public identify.
- In addition to outreaching to Cities of San Bernardino and Redlands, EPA recommends coordinating with other cities (including Loma Linda and Colton) that may also have interests in the proposed project. In particular, the proposed project's Layover Facility will likely impact residents and businesses in Loma Linda.
- Coordinate with the students and faculty at Valley College in Colton and Loma Linda University as they may also want access to the proposed passenger service.

At-Grade Crossings

EPA is concerned about the environmental and community impacts of the proposed project's 28 at-grade crossings and expected crossing closures. In particular, EPA is concerned that the proposed project's average of 1 at-grade crossing every 1/3rd of a mile may inadvertently increase vehicle miles traveled (VMT) (to find alternate routes) and vehicle idling, and subsequent emissions, during the passenger train's operation. EPA is further concerned that SANBAG and FTA adequately address the need for continued pedestrian and non-motorized uses, such as pedestrian footpaths, that may be occurring within and across the right of way since SANBAG purchased it from Burlington Northern Santa Fe (BNSF).

Recommendations:

- EPA recommends SANBAG and FTA analyze and identify traffic circulation and associated air emissions for the proposed project. Specific measures to minimize adverse impacts from the 28 at-grade crossings should be committed to in the DEIR/EA.
- EPA recommends that community outreach include the broadest spectrum of interest groups, including pedestrian and bicycle groups that can advise on their crossing needs through the right of way of the proposed project
- Include in the DEIR/EA a summary of community-recommended options and how these were integrated into project design, proposed at-grade crossings, and closures.

Air Quality

The DEIR/EA should provide a detailed discussion of ambient air conditions (baseline or existing conditions), National Ambient Air Quality Standards (NAAQS), criteria pollutant nonattainment areas, and potential air quality impacts of the project (including cumulative and indirect impacts) for each fully evaluated alternative. Because the South Coast Air Basin has some of the worst 8-hour ozone and PM_{2.5} (2006) problems in the nation, it is important to reduce emissions of ozone precursors and particulate matter from this Project to the maximum extent.

Recommendations:

- Disclose the available information about the health risks associated with diesel emissions, sensitive receptors in the vicinity of the project area, and how the proposed project will affect current emission levels.
- Work with the South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD), Caltrans, and regional planning agencies to ensure that methods to estimate emissions and anticipated emissions values from the proposed project are consistent with Air Quality Management Plan and Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) conformity determinations.
- Include an identification of potential hotspot impacts, especially where parking lots, idling locomotives, idling buses, and road modifications are proposed.
- Per our discussion on May 10th 2012, EPA understands a total of three (3) locomotives are required for this project. We recommend the highest efficiency locomotives and support your interest in using Tier 4 engines in your rehabilitated locomotives. Briefly discuss the contracting specifications that SANBAG and FTA plan to incorporate to require Tier 4 rehabilitated locomotives for the proposed project.

Transportation Conformity

To the extent that the proposed train system will require modification of the existing grade crossings, road network and construction of parking lots and transit facilities, the DEIR/EA should identify what elements of this project will require funding or approval by the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA). In addition, the DEIR/EA should demonstrate that the project is included in a conforming transportation plan and a transportation improvement program. SANBAG and FTA should work with SCAQMD and the regional planning agencies to ensure that applicable elements of the proposed project are consistent with future revisions of the RTP. The identification of sensitive receptors, and carbon monoxide and particulate matter hotspot analyses should be included in the DEIR/EA, especially where parking lots and road modifications are proposed.

Construction Mitigation Measures

The proposed Project will involve construction and staging along populated sections of the corridor. Because of the multiple receptors along the corridor, SANBAG and FTA should identify and commit to specific requirements to reduce emissions. The DEIR/EA should include SCAQMD requirements to reduce emissions. In addition to these measures, EPA recommends

the following additional measures to reduce the impacts resulting from future construction associated with this Project.

Recommendations:

In light of the serious health impacts associated with PM_{2.5} (fine particulate matter) and diesel exhaust exposure, we recommend that the best available control measures for these pollutants be implemented at all times and recommend that a Construction Emissions Mitigation Plan be incorporated into the DEIR/EA. We recommend that SCAQMD requirements, and the following additional measures be incorporated into the Construction Emissions Mitigation Plan, where feasible and appropriate, in order to reduce impacts associated with fugitive dust and emissions of PM_{2.5}, diesel exhaust, and mobile source air toxics from construction-related activities:

Fugitive Dust Source Controls:

- Install wind fencing and phase grading operations where appropriate, and operate water trucks for stabilization of surfaces under windy conditions.
- When hauling material and operating non-earthmoving equipment, prevent spillage and limit speeds to 15 miles per hour (mph). Limit speed of earth-moving equipment to 10 mph.

Mobile and Stationary Source Controls:

- Minimize use, trips, and unnecessary idling of heavy equipment.
- Maintain and tune engines per manufacturer's specifications to perform at EPA certification levels, where applicable, and to perform at verified standards applicable to retrofit technologies. Employ periodic, unscheduled inspections to limit unnecessary idling and to ensure that construction equipment is properly maintained, tuned, and modified consistent with established specifications. The California Air Resources Board has a number of mobile source anti-idling requirements which could be employed. See their website at: <http://www.arb.ca.gov/msprog/truck-idling/truck-idling.htm>
- Prohibit any tampering with engines and require continuing adherence to manufacturer's recommendations.
- If practicable, lease new, clean equipment meeting the most stringent of applicable Federal or State Standards. In general, commit to the best available emissions control technology. Tier 4 engines will be available in the 2009-model year and should be used for project construction equipment to the maximum extent feasible. Lacking availability of non-road construction equipment that meets Tier 4 engine standards, SANBAG/FTA should commit to using the best available emissions control technologies on all equipment.
- Utilize EPA-registered particulate traps and other appropriate controls where suitable to reduce emissions of diesel particulate matter and other pollutants at the construction site.

Administrative controls:

- Specify the means by which impacts to sensitive receptors, such as children, elderly, infirm and others identified in the DEIR/EA, will be minimized. For example, locate

construction equipment and staging zones away from sensitive receptors and fresh air intakes to buildings and air conditioners.

- Prepare an inventory of all equipment prior to construction and identify the suitability of add-on emission controls for each piece of equipment before groundbreaking. (Suitability of control devices is based on: whether there is reduced normal availability of the construction equipment due to increased downtime and/or power output, whether there may be significant damage caused to the construction equipment engine, or whether there may be a significant risk to nearby workers or the public.) Meet EPA diesel fuel requirements for off-road and on-highway, and, where appropriate, use alternative fuels such as natural gas and electric.

Maintenance and Layover Facility

EPA is concerned about the potential impacts from the proposed Layover Facility. In particular the DEIR/EA states that the Layover Facility will include train layover and storage, storage tracks, a vehicle wash, a 10,000 square foot building, ancillary facilities, and presumably employee vehicle parking.

Recommendations:

- The DEIR/EA should discuss potential localized health impacts and their mitigation, including noise, air quality, hazardous materials management and pollution prevention, water use and conservation, stormwater management, and changes to traffic circulation.
- SANBAG and FTA should outreach to the community for input on the Layover Facility's siting, hours of operation, and the potential localized health impacts from support equipment.

Sustainable Land Use and Station Design

Sustainability Policies

The RPRP provides a great opportunity to plan, construct and operate a new transit system in a way that improves environmental quality while being a catalyst for community development and neighborhood improvement. FTA is directed by Executive Order 13514 to provide an "integrated strategy towards sustainability". SANBAG and FTA should demonstrate the proposed RPRP meets the requirement of Executive Order 13514.

Executive Order on Sustainability (EO 13514)

"In order to create a clean energy economy that will increase our Nation's prosperity, promote energy security, protect the interests of taxpayers, and safeguard the health of our environment, the Federal Government must lead by example. It is therefore the policy of the United States that Federal agencies shall increase energy efficiency; measure, report, and reduce their greenhouse gas emissions from direct and indirect activities; conserve and protect water resources through efficiency, reuse, and stormwater management; eliminate waste, recycle, and prevent pollution; leverage agency acquisitions to foster markets for sustainable technologies and environmentally preferable materials, products, and services;

design, construct, maintain, and operate high performance sustainable buildings in sustainable locations; strengthen the vitality and livability of the communities in which Federal facilities are located; and inform Federal employees about and involve them in the achievement of these goals."

In addition, the HUD/DOT/EPA Partnership for Sustainable Communities is an interagency federal partnership established to better coordinate federal housing, transportation, and environmental protection investments. The partnership is based on the following principles:

- Provide more transportation choices
- Promote equitable, affordable housing
- Enhance economic competitiveness
- Support existing communities
- Coordinate and leverage federal policies and investment
- Value communities and neighborhoods

We note that there are multiple resources for integrating sustainability principles into the development of this project and encourage SANBAG and FTA to include a sustainability chapter in the DEIR/EA that outlines measures taken to meet sustainability goals and principles.

Recommendation:

- Identify how SANBAG and FTA are integrating these principles into proposed improvements in the project area, and coordinating with HUD, other modes at DOT, and EPA to ensure that potential improvements reflect the goals of the Partnership for Sustainable Communities. For additional information on the partnership, please visit EPA's website at <http://www.epa.gov/smartgrowth/partnership/>.
- Refer to the American Public Transportation Association recently published "Transit Sustainability Guidelines - A Framework for Approaching Sustainability and Overview of Best Practices" as a guide for integrating design, construction, and operation commitments that reduce the project's environmental footprint as much as possible (<http://www.apta.com/resources/hottopics/sustainability/Documents/Transit-Sustainability-Guidelines.pdf>)

Land Use

EPA anticipates that the RPRP may encourage a range of indirect and cumulative land use changes and recommends the following considerations be included in the DEIR/EA.

Recommendation:

- The DEIR/EA should identify all transportation improvements proposed to provide access to the proposed Project from anticipated key rider groups along the San Bernardino to Redlands corridor and surrounding population centers, including bicycle paths, transit connections, new methods to move people while reducing congestion, and increased bus service (express service, increase in service on existing routes, new routes, and BRT).
- The DEIR/EA should analyze and disclose the temporary and permanent environmental impacts of constructing stations, parking facilities, maintenance and

storage facilities, power propagation infrastructure, and required road developments and modifications.

- Because the project system is planned along the former Burlington Northern Santa Fe (BNSF) Railroad's Redlands Subdivision railroad corridor, the DEIR/EA should describe, in detail, the specific modifications to the existing rail network and rail crossings required.
- The DEIR/EA should also demonstrate specific design commitments to reduce environmental impacts associated with the construction of passenger stations and maintenance facilities, such as sharing existing downtown parking as opposed to building new, large expansive parking lots.
- The DEIR/EA should identify where proposed stations, parking facilities, and additional required infrastructure will be located in the project corridor, and should disclose the associated impacts from station development on planned and unplanned growth.
- Describe the expected land use changes associated with station locations, including rider access and traffic circulation changes.
- Describe how the proposed stations will link with area bicycle trails and paths, including, but not limited to, the Colton Rail-Trail, Santa Ana River Trail, and Waterman Avenue Bikeway. [http://www.ie511.org/downloads/sanbag_bikeways.pdf] Also consider a bike-pedestrian trail opportunity for the remaining ROW extending from Redlands University to Wabash Avenue near Mentone.
- Describe the associated environmental impacts of those land use changes, including indirect and cumulative impacts. EPA recommends the use of the June 2005 *Guidance for Preparers of Indirect and Cumulative Impacts Analysis* developed jointly by Caltrans, FHWA, and EPA [http://www.dot.ca.gov/ser/cumulative_guidance/purpose.htm]. The guidance will assist in identifying cumulative impacts and preparing an analysis that is sound and well documented.
- Identify parties responsible for mitigating the environmental impacts associated with the indirect and cumulative impacts of the projected land use changes.
- Identify the timeline for improvements and maintenance, especially how this Project's implementation relates to the Santa Fe Depot renovation project.

Station Design

EPA recommends the DEIR/EA describe any proposed station designs and identify opportunities for sustainability measures, including energy efficiency and pollution prevention measures.

Recommendations:

- Incorporate the best practices and use the checklists from the Federal Railroad Administration's *Station Area Planning* document of June 2011 [http://www.fra.dot.gov/downloads/FRA_Station_Area_Planning_June_2011_c.pdf]
- Minimize the number of parking spaces to the greatest extent possible at the station in order to encourage the use of transit and pedestrian access;
- Coordinate with other transit providers to maximize intermodal access to the proposed stations;

- Design the new facilities to be pedestrian and bicycle-friendly, including secure bicycle parking, and bikes on trains. Some of these uses can be seamlessly integrated with some ADA requirements.
- Support policies that will increase density and mixed-uses in and near the station areas.
- Consider renewable energy generation and water conservation measures at stations with shaded platforms and other amenities.

Relationship to Regional Transportation Projects

The DEIR/EA for the proposed RPRP should specifically identify how the proposed rail project relates to the broader Regional rail and transit networks. The DEIR/EA can discuss how the project integrates with regional transportation plans and may support LA Metrolink, the LOSSAN Rail Corridor, and the proposed Ontario Airport high-speed rail station.

Recommendations:

- Address how SANBAG and FTA will insure that the Project is compatible and complementary with other rail and/or transit systems, and will avoid potential duplication of efforts and incompatibilities. For example, discuss how the proposed Project's passenger service complements the existing Omnitrans bus Route 9 service, and the new sbX Bus Rapid Transit service. The DEIR/EA can also discuss the compatibility of the proposed rolling stock and locomotives with LA Metrolink.
- Identify the specific features of the Project that are being designed to "link up" with the other transportation, commuting, transit, and intercity proposals in the region. This may include physical connections, schedules, ticketing, and other factors.
- SANBAG and FTA should consider including the bike path planned for the disused (<http://maps.sanbag.ca.gov/gisportal/2012/04/sanbag-bicycle-plan-available-online/>) portion of the right of way in the proposed RPRP. Lying between the proposed University of Redlands station and North Wabash Avenue in Mentone the disused portion of the right of way could become a high-quality and safe bike route to feed riders onto the proposed passenger rail service as it is inaugurated, and improve vehicle circulation on nearby streets.

20 so air quality, general visual aesthetics of the

CFR 381.315(b)). If the Agency denies the request, it must state the reason for doing so. If the decision is to grant the exemption, the notice must specify the person or class of persons receiving the exemption and the regulatory provision or provisions from which an exemption is granted. The notice must also specify the effective period of the exemption (up to 2 years) and explain the terms and conditions of the exemption. The exemption may be renewed (49 CFR 381.315(c) and 49 CFR 381.300(b)).

Transecurity's Application for Exemption

Transecurity has applied for an exemption from 49 CFR 393.60(e)(1) to allow the installation of the camera-based OBMS at the bottom of the windshield on CMVs. A copy of the application is included in the docket referenced at the beginning of this notice.

Section 393.60(e)(1) of the FMCSRs prohibits the obstruction of the driver's field of view by devices mounted at the top of the windshield. Antennas, transponders and similar devices (devices) must not be mounted more than 152 mm (6 inches) below the upper edge of the windshield. These devices must be located outside the area swept by the windshield wipers and outside the driver's sight lines to the road and highway signs and signals.

Transecurity has applied for the exemption because it wants to install the camera-based OBMS equipment in up to 500 CMVs operating throughout the United States in support of research being conducted on behalf of FMCSA. Transecurity contends that it must be able to mount the camera-based OBMSs lower than allowed under 49 CFR 393.60(e)(1) "because the safety equipment must have a clear forward facing view of the road, and low enough to accurately scan facial features for detection of impaired driving." Transecurity's mounting preference for the camera-based OBMS and necessary mounting brackets is at the bottom of the windshield, and is best suited for mounting within and/or below 3 inches of the bottom of the windshield wiper sweep, and out of the driver's sightlines to the road and highway signs and signals, to the extent practicable.

FMCSA Grant of Waiver to Transecurity

Pursuant to 49 U.S.C. 31315(a) and 49 CFR part 381, subpart B, the FMCSA granted Transecurity a 90-day waiver on July 23, 2012 to allow the placement of the OBMS at the bottom of windshields on CMVs, outside of the area permitted by § 393.60 of the FMCSRs. This waiver

is effective from July 24, 2012, through October 23, 2012. Up to 500 OBMS will be installed, and the affected motor carriers are listed as below:

1. DOT # 90792; Eagle Transport Corporation—Florida.
2. DOT # 252234; Holiday Tours Inc.—Randleman, NC.
3. DOT # 16377; H&W Trucking Co. Inc.—Mt. Airy, NC.
4. DOT # 348258; Associated Grocers—Baton Rouge, LA.
5. DOT # 2222676; AM Express Inc.—Escanaba, MI.

During the waiver period, these motor carriers participating in the FMCSA research field operation test must ensure that the OBMS is mounted within 3 inches of the bottom of the driver side windshield wiper sweep, and out of the driver's sightlines to the road and highway signs and signals as much as practicable. Vehicles participating in the study must carry a copy of this waiver in the vehicle.

In accordance with 49 U.S.C. 31315 and 31136(e), FMCSA requests public comment from all interested persons on Transecurity's application for an exemption from 49 CFR 393.60(e)(1). All comments received before the close of business on the comment closing date indicated at the beginning of this notice will be considered and will be available for examination in the docket at the location listed under the "Addresses" section of this notice. Comments received after the comment closing date will be filed in the public docket and will be considered to the extent practicable. In addition to late comments, FMCSA will also continue to file, in the public docket, relevant information that becomes available after the comment closing date. Interested persons should continue to examine the public docket for new material.

SUMMARY: FTA and San Bernardino Associated Governments (SANBAG) intend to prepare an EIS/EIR for the Redlands Passenger Rail Project (RPRP or Project). Early in 2012, FTA and SANBAG began the preparation of an Environmental Assessment (EA)/EIR for the RPRP and conducted two scoping meetings; one on April 24 in the City of Redlands and the other on May 2 in the City of San Bernardino. Based on the input received from the community, including written comment letters, and preliminary findings from ongoing technical studies, FTA determined that an EIS is required. The EIS/EIR will be prepared in accordance with regulations implementing the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA: 42 U.S.C. 4321 et seq.) of 1969 and the regulations implementing NEPA set forth in 40 CFR Parts 1500–1508 and 23 CFR Part 771, as well as provisions of the Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU). The purpose of this Notice is to:

- Advise the public that FTA is the lead Federal agency;
- Provide information about the proposed project, purpose and need for the project, and alternatives to be considered; and
- Invite public and agency participation in the EIS process.

The EIS/EIR will examine alternatives to provide a cost-effective, alternative travel option for communities located along the Redlands Corridor in a way that improves transit mobility, travel times, and corridor safety.

SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION:

Purpose and Need for the Project: The overall purpose of the Project is to

provide a cost-effective, travel alternative for communities located along the Redlands Corridor that would improve transit mobility, travel times, and corridor safety while minimizing adverse environmental impacts. The RPRP would provide travelers and commuters with a new mobility option that would achieve more-efficient travel times than automobiles or other transit alternatives within an existing corridor. The Project is needed because population growth has increased roadway congestion, which has increased commute travel times for work and recreational purposes, increased the number of hours of lost productivity, increased fuel consumption, contributed to air pollution, interfered with emergency response vehicles, and caused spillover effects onto secondary and alternative routes. SANBAG also needs to maintain existing freight service along the corridor per its purchase agreement with the Burlington Northern Santa Fe (BNSF) Railroad.

Project Location and Environmental Setting: The RPRP would introduce passenger rail service along an existing railroad right-of-way (ROW) from the City of San Bernardino on the west to the City of Redlands on the east. This existing ROW is commonly referred to as the Redlands Corridor, an approximately 9-mile rail spur segment that extends east from E Street in the City of San Bernardino. Passenger rail service would serve passengers from five platforms located at E Street, Tippecanoe Avenue, New York Street, Orange Street, and University Street. SANBAG proposes the construction of a single track within a ROW 50 feet wide, with a passing siding one-mile long located near the midpoint of the alignment. Project components would include track improvements; boarding platforms; passenger amenities such as ticket vending machines, shade canopies with seating; pedestrian access to the public ROW, lighting, parking areas; grade crossing improvements; utility and traffic improvements; and construction of a train layover facility. The proposed Project would not include the purchase of additional vehicles. Passenger rail operations would start in 2018.

Possible Alternatives: The EIS/EIR will consider alternatives to the proposed Project consistent with the requirements of NEPA. SANBAG anticipates that this may include consideration of Alternative 1—No Build, Alternative 2—Preferred Project, Alternative 3—Reduced Project Footprint, Alternative 4—Light Rail Transit, Alternative 5—Bus Rapid

Transit, Design Option 1—Train Layover Facility (Waterman Avenue), and Design Option 2—Use of Existing Train Layover Facilities. Other alternatives and/or design options may also be considered. These alternatives are described further as follows:

- *Alternative 1—No Build:* Track improvements and facilities would not be constructed to facilitate passenger rail service between San Bernardino and the University of Redlands. Under this alternative, track maintenance and rehabilitation of existing bridge structures would be required throughout the western 3.5 miles of the rail corridor to facilitate continued freight service.

- *Alternative 2—Preferred Project:* SANBAG would construct track and grade crossing improvements, bridge replacements, rail platform, and new train layover facilities to facilitate passenger rail service along the 9-mile corridor.

- *Alternative 3—Reduced Project Footprint:* Track improvements and facilities would be constructed as described for the Preferred Project but they would be constructed within a narrower permanent easement, where feasible, to minimize direct impacts on sensitive biological, cultural, and public park resources. Alternative bridge structures would be constructed at Warm Creek and the Santa Ana River.

- *Alternative 4—Light Rail Transit:* This alternative would involve development of the rail corridor with new tracking and an overhead catenary system to power the light rail transit (LRT) vehicles.

- *Alternative 5—Bus Rapid Transit:* Under this alternative, a new bus rapid transit (BRT) guideway would be constructed adjacent to the existing freight track, which will be used solely by BRT vehicles. Signalization would be required at all existing grade crossings as opposed to the use of crossing gates.

- *Design Option 1—Train Layover Facility (Waterman Avenue):* Track improvements and facilities would be constructed as described for the Preferred Project but the Train Layover Facility would be constructed at a different location, west of the Santa Ana River, east of Waterman Avenue, and immediately north of the rail corridor.

- *Design Option 2—Use of Existing Train Layover Facilities:* Track improvements and facilities would be constructed as described for the Preferred Project. However, instead of constructing new layover facilities as described for the Preferred Project and Alternative 3, the project would not construct layover facilities but use the existing Metrolink layover facilities located west of E Street.

Areas of investigation include, but are not limited to, land use, land acquisitions, displacements, and relocations, community and neighborhood character, transportation, visual quality and aesthetics, air quality, greenhouse gases, and global climate change, noise and vibration, biological and wetland resources (including threatened and endangered species), agricultural resources, floodplains and hydrology, geology, soils, and seismicity, hazardous waste and materials, water quality, energy use, utilities, cultural and historic resources, parklands, community services and facilities, safety and security, socioeconomic, environmental justice, and cumulative effects. Measures to avoid, minimize, or mitigate any significant adverse impacts will be identified.

Probable Effects: The EIS/EIR will consider in detail the potential environmental effects of the alternatives under consideration based on the current scoping efforts. The Draft EIS/EIR and Final EIS/EIR will summarize the results of coordination with federal, state, and local agencies and the public at large; present the appropriate federal, state, and local regulations and policies; inventory and compile previous studies pertinent to the project; describe the methodology used to assess impacts; identify and describe the affected environment; analyze and document the construction related (short-term) and operational (long-term) environmental consequences (direct, indirect, and cumulative) of the project alternatives; and identify opportunities and measures that mitigate any identified adverse impacts. The specific scope of analysis and study areas used to undertake the analysis in the EIS/EIR will be established during the public and agency scoping process.

FTA Procedures: The EIS/EIR is being prepared in accordance with the NEPA of 1969, as amended, and implemented by the Council on Environmental Quality (CEQ) regulations (40 CFR parts 1500–1508), FHWA environmental impact regulations (49 CFR part 622, 23 CFR part 771, and 23 CFR part 774), and Section 6002 of the SAFETEA–LU of 2005. The EIS/EIR will also comply with requirements of Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, as amended, Section 4(f) of the U.S. Department of Transportation Act of 1966, the 1990 Clean Air Act Amendments, Executive Order 12898 (Federal Actions to Address Environmental Justice in Minority and Low-Income Populations), Executive Order 11990 (Protection of Wetlands), and other applicable federal laws, rules,

and regulations. The EIS/EIR will also satisfy environmental review requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). Regulations implementing NEPA, as well as provisions of SAFETEA–LU, call for public involvement in the EIS process. Section 6002 of SAFETEA–LU requires that FTA and SANBAG do the following: (1) Extend an invitation to other Federal and non-Federal agencies and Indian tribes that may have an interest in the proposed project to become “participating agencies,” (2) provide an opportunity for involvement by participating agencies and the public in helping to define the purpose and need for a proposed project, as well as the range of alternatives for consideration in the impact statement, and (3) establish a plan for coordinating public and agency participation and comments on the environmental review process. An invitation to become a participating agency, with the scoping information packet appended, will be extended to other Federal and non-Federal agencies and Indian tribes that may have an interest in the proposed project. It is possible that we may not be able to identify all Federal and non-Federal agencies and Indian tribes that may have such an interest. Any Federal or non-Federal agency or Indian tribe interested in the proposed Project that does not receive an invitation to become a participating agency should notify at the earliest opportunity the Project Managers identified above under **ADDRESSES**.

A comprehensive public involvement program has been developed and a public and agency involvement Coordination Plan will be created. The program includes, among other things, a Project Web site (<http://sanbag.ca.gov/projects/redlands-transit.html>); outreach to local and county officials and community and civic groups; a public scoping process to define the issues of concern among all parties interested in the Project; establishment of a community advisory committee and organizing periodic meetings with that committee; a public hearing on release of the Draft EIS/EIR; and development and distribution of Project newsletters.

SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION: The Longhorn Pipeline runs from El Paso, Texas to Houston, Texas and is owned and operated by Magellan Pipeline Company, L.P. (Magellan). The Longhorn Pipeline currently transports refined petroleum products from east to west (Houston to El Paso). The Proposed Project would convert the segment of the Longhorn Pipeline from Crane, Texas to East Houston, Texas to crude oil service and reverse the flow so that crude oil would flow from west to east (Crane to Houston). At Crane, refined products would enter the pipeline and move west to El Paso. The refined products would enter the Longhorn Pipeline via an existing pipeline segment that connects the Longhorn Pipeline to the existing Orion West Pipeline located to the north of the Longhorn Pipeline. The Orion West Pipeline runs from Frost, Texas to El Paso and is also owned and operated by Magellan.

PHMSA is responsible for regulating the transportation of hazardous liquids via pipeline. PHMSA issues and

enforces pipeline safety regulations that dictate requirements for construction, design, testing, operation, and maintenance of natural gas and hazardous liquid (including crude oil, petroleum products, and anhydrous ammonia) pipelines. PHMSA does not typically serve as lead agency for pipeline construction projects, as it has no authority over pipeline siting and does not issue any approval or authorization to commence a pipeline construction project. However, a settlement agreement specific to this action titled: "The Longhorn Mitigation Plan" (LMP) resulted from litigation associated with changes to the Longhorn Pipeline in 1999. The LMP provides PHMSA with broader responsibility and oversight of the Longhorn Pipeline.

The Proposed Project would require upgrades to the pipeline and would include construction of a six-mile pipeline segment in El Paso and a 2.5-mile pipeline segment in Houston. Modifications and upgrades to existing infrastructure to facilitate reversal and increased capacity, such as new pump stations and terminals, would occur at various locations along the Longhorn and Orion Pipelines' right-of-ways. Although not originally included in the LMP, activities along the Orion West Pipeline and the segment from Odessa to Crane that would take place as a result of the Proposed Project are analyzed in this Draft EA as connected actions.

This Draft EA analyzes the changes that would take place as a result of the Proposed Project and how the changes could impact the human environment during construction, normal operations, and in the unlikely event of a release. PHMSA has also analyzed the condition of the Longhorn Pipeline and how the change in product and direction would affect the pipeline.

This letter is a formal response to the Notice of Preparation for the Redlands Passenger Rail Project. Please see below environmental impact concerns for Catalina Garden Apartments (34 - 2 bedroom apartments) and Catalina Court Apartments (3 two bedroom apartments and one three bedroom single family residence). **Catalina Garden Apartments are less than 200-feet from the proposed passenger rail.**

Noise – Diesel Engines

It is our understanding from the scoping meetings that the passenger rail would run by diesel engines running every ½ hour each way. Noise from the diesel engines would have a negative impact on resident's living standards.

Noise – Crossing Bells

Noise from the crossing bells would also have a negative impact on resident's living standards.

Vibration

Vibration from the diesel engines and cars would have a negative impact on resident's living standards.

Air Quality

Diesel exhaust would have a negative impact on resident's living standards.

Traffic and Circulation - Congestion

University Street is a very busy main thoroughfare. The West bound "on ramp" to the 10 freeway and the East bound "off ramp" is located on University Street within a ¼ mile of the proposed passenger rail crossing. Because of these "on" and "off" ramps to the 10 freeway University Street and other streets that "spill" on to University Street experience heavy traffic. The University of Redlands and Redlands High School is also accessed by University Street further adding to this daily heavy traffic. Students that attend The University of Redlands and Redlands High School walk and ride bicycles and cross the proposed passenger rail crossing. The passenger rail would greatly add to the already heavy traffic congestion that exists. Residents of Catalina Garden Apartments, freeway commuters, surrounding neighbors, University of Redlands students and Redlands High School students would be negatively impacted by the further congestion the proposed passenger rail and rail crossing on University Street would create.

Traffic and Circulation – Dangerous Environment

Many Residents of Catalina Garden Apartments are students of the University of Redlands. Many of these students walk and ride there bicycle's to the school campus and would encounter a dangerous environment with the coming and going of the passenger rail.

Parks and Recreational Facilities – Accessing Sylvan Park

Residents of Catalina Garden Apartments and residents of the City of Redlands would be negatively affected by the passenger rail when trying to access Sylvan Park.

Parks and Recreational Facilities – Dangerous Environment


Residents of Catalina Garden Apartments and other people visiting Sylvan Park would encounter a more dangerous environment with passenger rail cars running every ½ hour within 100 feet of Sylvan Park. Any temporary or permanent easements on or across RUSD property have not been proposed or identified to me as of this time.

SANBAG Redlands Passenger Rail Project EIS/EIR Comment:

When voters first approved rail service for California, the estimated price tag was much lower. Over the years, that cost has increased significantly. With California's poor economy, along with loss of jobs for California residents, we cannot afford rail at such an exorbitant price tag. Even the *San Bernardino* Sun newspaper has published several editorial articles stating rail is much too expensive at this time. The six-mile rail from Redlands to San Bernardino is poorly planned. First of all, rail is way too expensive for the average passenger. Many are students, low income, seniors, or looking for jobs. Secondly, the rail doesn't even stop in Loma Linda. Many people in Redlands and San Bernardino work in Loma Linda. Why wouldn't the rail accommodate the people who work in Loma Linda? The traffic during the 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. hours needs to be lowered. The Omnitrans sbX bus project will do that, along with providing service along the current Route 2 that provides service all the way to Cal State San Bernardino. I see the Route 2 buses every morning and they are packed. The cost of riding the sbX is way less than rail and will provide more frequent service (every 15 minutes). It would be much cheaper to just extend the sbX to Redlands than build this rail. Significant funding will be taken away from Omnitrans for this six-mile rail. Omnitrans serves most of San Bernardino County. Why take funding from all passengers in the county for this too-expensive six-mile rail? With the City of San Bernardino being bankrupt, they will not be developing the transit center at Rialto and E Street. Omnitrans' budget for this center is only for bus pads and restrooms for the drivers. What are the people on the rail pulling into at this San Bernardino transit center? A large dusty weed-filled plot of land in a bad part of town. The sbX will run every 15 minutes and stop at multiple stops along this route. This bus route will provide more and greater service to transit passengers than this very poorly planned rail service. Perhaps this rail could be built in the future, but now is definitely not the time. The timing of this rail service is just as bad as the planning. The residents of San Bernardino County expect SANBAG to dispense Measure I funds in a reasonable, responsible manner to the transit agencies in this county. Taking \$100.1 million of funding from Omnitrans to pay for a rail that will have much fewer passengers than most bus routes and cost significantly more than a bus pass is not reasonable or responsible. I beg SANBAG to think of the negative impact on transit passengers in the entire county for a six-mile rail that hardly anyone will use.

The University of Redlands is a supporter and participant in the Redlands Passenger Rail Project. The last station location within Redlands is at the University of Redlands. The University of Redlands is located north of the proposed station and it also owns lands surrounding the proposed "University Station" location. Based upon this unique situation the University wants to ensure that the project addresses potential environmental impacts associated with the project and fully evaluates reasonable alternatives and potential mitigation measures for the project.

The University is concerned with the impacts that will occur from the rail operations. Our understanding is that the passenger rail service would utilize previously owned rail vehicles consisting of a single trainset composed of one locomotive and up to two cars. The University has existing educational and theatrical performance facilities located directly north of the proposed transit station which will be negatively impacted by noise, vibration, and air pollution caused from the rail service. It is important, therefore, that the level of these impacts be identified, evaluated, and minimized to the full extent feasible. It had been indicated in earlier discussions with the University of Redlands that the SCAQMD might participate in developing a locomotive that would result in less noise and vibration as well as reducing air quality impacts. The University would like this alternative and/or other alternative equipment evaluated as one way to minimize noise, vibration, and air quality impacts. In addition to consideration of alternative equipment, we would want to ensure that if refurbished Metrolink equipment is utilized that the equipment is modified and/or equipped so as to minimize noise, vibration and air quality impacts to the greatest extent feasible.

Another noise concern that relates to typical rail operations is the blowing of horns at street crossings. This operational component of rail service is of particular concern as it pertains to the crossing at University Street which is adjacent to the campus. The horn blowing will be disruptive to educational classes and theatrical performances located in the buildings located


just northeast of University Street. We would like SANBAG, as a part of this project, to evaluate designing the crossing at University Street so that "horn blowing" is not needed. The University is familiar with other railroad crossings in the area that are designed so that horn blowing is not needed. Developing a non-horn blowing railroad crossing at University Street will be a significant noise mitigation factor for this project.

The southern portion of the University of Redlands Campus and the proposed station location to the east of University Street is within a floodplain. The City of Redlands is currently proceeding on a project to build a detention basin (Opal Basin) within Mentone, east of the station site, which will significantly reduce potential flooding to the site. It may be feasible to incorporate other elements into the flood control system (such as making improvements to the Zanja Creek, developing additional detention basins, and/or putting in storm drain links) that will eliminate or significantly reduce floodplain issues from the University Station site. Flooding is a significant impact for the development of the station that should be evaluated. Flooding potential will also have a significant impact on the proposed Transit Oriented Development planned in proximity to the station. It is recommended that as a part of the project flood control alternatives be evaluated so as to mitigate impacts to the project.

The project includes track replacement, grade crossing improvements, traffic and rail signals, and development of transit stations. Some of these improvements will be constructed directly adjacent to the campus. Construction impacts should be evaluated and mitigated. The impacts to be considered for review and mitigation should include increased traffic, noise, vibration, dust, and air quality.

We appreciate the opportunity to provide comments, concerns and recommendations with regards to the impacts of the Redlands Rail Project. If you need further clarification regarding the issues we have raised, please let us know. We look forward to actively participating in the EIR/EA process.

Omnitrans looks forward to participating in the Environmental Impact Statement/Environmental Impact Report (EIS/EIR) process for the Redlands Passenger Rail (Project). We appreciate the opportunity to comment on the scope of the EIS/EIR and to provide our perspective as a provider of transportation services in the San Bernardino Valley. The purpose of this letter is to make SANBAG and the FTA aware of potential social, economic, and environmental impacts of the Project that should be studied in the EIS/EIR in order to facilitate informed decision making.

By way of background, Omnitrans has been providing public transportation services to the residents of the 15 cities and unincorporated areas in the San Bernardino Valley for 36 years. Our transportation services ensure that our passengers, many of whom are low-income and public transit dependent, can reach jobs, schools, and healthcare providers and can patronize local businesses. Omnitrans service is vital to the local economy, serving a population that is 78% Low Income and Minority (LIM is the aggregate of all minorities and all non-minority whites who live below poverty level; *source*: Omnitrans Title VI Triennial Update, July 2012). Omnitrans employs approximately 700 full-time employees.

Thus, any regional decision to reallocate funds from one mode of transportation to another must be carefully weighed to consider the potential impacts on the regional community including all 15 cities and the unincorporated areas served by Omnitrans. It is the responsibility of the lead agency and other agencies participating in the Project development and EIS/EIR preparation to work collaboratively with impacted parties and other interested stakeholders to ensure that the region's limited transportation dollars are invested in a way that improves regional community mobility.

Given the limited transportation investment money available in the region, it is critical that there be a clear demonstration of purpose and need for the Project. Thus, Omnitrans suggests that the following data and related analysis be included in the EIS/EIR in order to adequately evaluate potential social, economic, and environmental impacts of the Project:

- 1. Analysis of other feasible bus rapid transit or express bus alternatives.** Because the Alternatives Analysis conducted by SANBAG in 2009 studied only one bus rapid transit alternative, which would operate in the rail right of way, it was found to be a costly alternative that would not meet FTA's criteria for federal funding eligibility (*source*: Redlands Corridor Strategic Plan, staff report to SANBAG board, April 6, 2011). Omnitrans requests the analysis of other feasible alternatives that would meet the project's objective of providing efficient, cost-effective public transportation between Redlands and San Bernardino. Examples could be freeway-running express service, limited-stop bus service, or an extension of the E Street sbX bus rapid transit line from its current terminus at the VA hospital in Loma Linda to Redlands. The extension would also open up the possibility of providing rapid, efficient transit service to connect Redlands residents to approximately 15,000 jobs in Loma Linda.

All alternatives evaluated in the SANBAG's 2009 Alternatives Analysis would operate in the existing rail alignment; this misses the opportunity to connect to employment centers in Loma Linda and lacks the flexibility to serve other major destinations in the surrounding area. The EIR/EIS should evaluate the comparative ridership projections, travel times, service frequency and service span, and benefits of all the feasible alternatives.


- 2. Analysis of the potential economic impacts of the Project.** The preliminary Omnitrans Comprehensive Operational Analysis reports prepared by SANBAG indicate that reallocation of Local Transportation Fund revenues from bus services to the Project from FY 2014 to FY 2020 may have an adverse impact on bus services. The potential diversion of transportation funds from bus service to the Project could have significant impacts to bus transit services in the 15 cities and unincorporated areas served by Omnitrans. A loss of funds may impact Omnitrans' ability to maintain the safety of its current infrastructure (stops, stations, Transcenters, passenger information system) and could result in blight along Omnitrans' routes and at Transit Centers (a concern under CEQA). Because Omnitrans, as the designated recipient of FTA funds, is responsible for ensuring compliance with all federal regulations, we want to ensure that the EIR/EIS will include all required Title VI and Environmental Justice analysis concerning potential financial and other impacts of the project.

Finally, Omnitrans requests copies of the following documentation as previously requested in its May 10, 2012 scoping letter:

- Opening-year and long-term ridership projections for the Redlands Passenger Rail Project, by station (including the methodology and land use assumptions used to arrive at the ridership projections);
- Station plans and/or station area Transit Oriented Development (TOD) conceptual plans that have been prepared by Gruen Associates for SANBAG and HDR in partnership with cities of Redlands and San Bernardino (TOD plans and policies expected to be adopted by Fall 2012 according to May 12, 2012 public workshop presentation on SANBAG's website); and
- Preliminary conceptual estimates of costs, funding sources, and operating scenarios for Phase I, and Phase II;
- Any other information that has been sent to impacted parties.

Once again, Omnitrans appreciates the opportunity to provide scoping comments. Omnitrans requests that the lead agency/agencies consult with Omnitrans to obtain needed information throughout the remainder of the EIR/EIS process. Subject: Redlands Passenger Rail Project (RPRP) EIS/EIR Scoping Comments

The Redlands Passenger Rail Project (RPRP) enacted by SANBAG depletes all local transit funds available to ameliorate transportation services in this region over the next 30 to 50 years. According to columnist Cassie MacDuff's article on September 13, 2012, "extending passenger rail service to Redlands has been discussed publicly for, what, about 20 years?" She is absolutely correct; I know this firsthand because I worked on this project 20 years ago. What she failed to mention in her article was the conclusion of all the studies conducted over the past 20 years: "it is neither cost effective nor sustainable to operate any kind of rail service along this corridor." For this reason, the U.S. Department of Transportation's Federal Transit Administration has repeatedly rejected performance based competitive funds for the construction and operation of this project. Essentially, the plan was not concordant with the reasonably liberal performance standards of the federal government for funding such projects. In fact, even the FTA officials I talked to are rather astounded by this project and the local government's desire to make such an extensive investment for such an insignificant return on the investment.

Another couple of lesser details Ms. MacDuff failed to acknowledge were the extent of taxpayer money utilized on assessing and reassessing this project over the 20 years (said diminutive studies under elegant names and titles now amount to over \$5 to \$7 million) and the insignificant number of passengers this rail line is projected to transport. According to my prognostications, the starting year ridership will be less than 600 passengers per day and a little over 1,200 passengers per day by 2035. Any estimation above this involves "creative" ridership forecasting. These particulars beg the question – why is SANBAG so eager to build the most expensive and subsidized, and the least sustainable and productive rail line in the country?

As a resident of this region and a retired professional, I am appalled by the level of professional irresponsibility, the blatant lack of knowledge and concern for the residents – the taxpayers. My conversations with numerous policymakers revealed that they were not cognizant of the vital details of this project, such as the total cost, how it will be paid for, who will reimburse it, how many passengers this rail line is going to transport, etc. Seven of the elected officials I talked to could not respond to any of these questions. Even more astonishing is that some of them voted for this project. The technical studies conducted so far, as well as the inadequate and misdirecting data shared with the policy makers and the public, demand further analysis and clarity of accurate and complete information with said policy makers and the community. The Board needs to be reminded that this is an investment made by the public for the public; therefore, SANBAG must share pertinent knowledge with the public.

What do I mean by accurate and complete information? SANBAG's website states the cost of Phase I will be between \$130 – 150 million. This is erroneous. The total project cost need to include all expenditures such as planning, engineering, legal, administrative, land acquisition, environmental clearance, facilities, construction costs, operating facilities, etc. The support facilities alone (stations, park-and-ride lots, etc.) will cost more than \$150 million. In said situation, SANBAG has apportioned this project into numerous subprojects. According to SCAG, Phase I will cost over \$530 million, Phase II, another \$500 million plus, and Phase III, still an unknown expenditure but includes the downtown passenger rail project accounting for over \$90 million as well maintenance and operating facilities for future phases, operating and management costs, etc., etc. This, in total, will amount to over a BILLION DOLLARS! In conclusion, this is not a \$150 million dollar project as has been claimed. SANBAG is misdirecting the public and policy makers.

Further, there is no private investment to build or finance the required stations, supportive land uses and the Transit Oriented Developments. There is no private investment period! At the public scoping meeting SANBAG staff mentioned that "all of this would be paid by the private sector." Show the documentation. This project and the plan are technically flawed.

Now, therefore, I request that SANBAG analyze the following items in the EIS/EIR so that the citizens of this region could properly evaluate the impacts of this project:

- 1. Analyze all viable mobility options and alternatives.**
- 2. Share technical and financial information with the public and its socioeconomic impacts on the residents of this region.**
- 3. Provide sufficient data and analysis supporting the ridership projections.**
- 4. Analyze the costs and benefits of this investment and share the information with the residents.**
- 5. Reveal the project financing plan with potential risks and impacts on the region as a result of this multimillion dollar, three phase project broken into multiple subprojects. All impacts resulting from this project should be studied under NEPA. Dividing major projects down to multiple subprojects to circumvent NEPA is illegal and unethical.**
- 6. Correct all inaccurate and incomplete reports and cost estimates. The information shared with public is inaccurate and extremely misleading. This is not a \$150 million project and it's going to transport less the 600 passengers per day. Show the data and the analysis.**





History lesson for city

REDLANDS — Lovers of the city's history got a treat on Sunday when Joan McCall's book release party for "Redlands Remembered" was held at the Barnes & Noble here.

With a Sharpie in hand, McCall smiled as she signed copies of her book, which explores the city's history with stories and photos.

She began writing several months ago when she heard History Press was looking for someone who could provide a book on the history of Redlands.

Using stories from her former monthly column, "Regarding Redlands" — which was published in the Daily Facts from the mid-1990s to early 2000s — and other features on the city, McCall sent it to the publishing company in December.

McCall said she worked for six months to make sure stories were updated and facts were double-checked. She also provided pictures to go with each story.

A retired history teacher and librarian, McCall said doing the research was fun, adding that Redlands has "some wonderful his-

tory in terms of the buildings and places they've preserved, but also the interesting people that have lived here over time.

"It's fun to tell the stories (and) to find the stories, and going through old issues to see what was going on 100 years ago."

One of McCall's favorite stories is about Redlands High School.

Voters rejected the first bond issue for the school because they didn't like the selected site. It was near railroad tracks, and it was feared it would be too noisy for students and teachers.

"Not very long after they changed the location to where it is now," McCall said. "The bond issue passed for even more money than the first one."

The bond was for \$17,000, the amount that is being raised for the high school's Mural Project, which will display the school's original buildings constructed in 1891. The mural will include a view of the school's Clock Auditorium, built in 1928.

To help fund the mural, McCall partnered with Barnes & Noble to donate a percentage of purchases made at the store through Wednesday.

Up to 20 percent of proceeds will be donated toward the project by providing the code 10827574, said Laurie Aldern, the community-relations manager for the Redlands store.

"We'll be part of Redlands history forever. It's a big effort," Aldern said. "Redlands culture is important to people, but not everyone has as much money as they used to donate. So for us to promote a book and promote literacy and art, that's what we are all about."

"And for me personally, (this event) is really neat because Joan has taught all three of my kids and she's been very involved in many book fairs for the middle schools, and she herself is very invested in the community."

"This was a wonderful way to honor her and all that she has done for the community."

McCall also read excerpts to store visitors and answered questions.

Costs create dilemma in R.C.

Landscaping fees or services likely to change

RANCHO CUCAMONGA — As landscape maintenance costs for a large section of the city rise, officials are considering options to reduce service levels or increase assessment rates for residents.

Options are being considered for the city's largest landscape district — Landscape Maintenance District, or LMD No. 2.

The district is an L-shaped area bounded by Etiwanda Avenue in the east, the 210 Freeway in the north and the half-way line between Milliken and Haven avenues in the west. Base Line Road forms much of the southern border, except for the eastern end, which dips down to Church Street.

This fiscal year, a budget

shortfall for the district has been calculated at about \$222,000 as spending has out-paced revenue.

As maintenance costs have increased, officials say some sort of service-level adjustment or rate increase will be necessary, but residents be able to weigh in through a survey next spring. Before then, city officials will hold outreach events this fall.

"We would be able to make the budget work with the same LMD assessment in 1993, but costs are not the same as 1993, so it's really up to the property owners to decide," said Deputy City Manager Lori Sassoon said.

"Should we look at improved landscaping or invest in drought-tolerant landscaping, or look at reducing our maintenance costs? There's no way to maintain landscaping" at current rates, she said.

A meeting between public officials and residents held recently presented preliminary

ideas such as increasing the annual rate by about \$38 or decommissioning the care of 1.5 million square feet of grass turf.

Public Works Services Director William Wittkopf said the ideas are not final and that plans will be better defined through more feedback from the community.

"The idea of the public engagement process was well-received, and a lot of the folks like the idea of being able to have focused and detailed discussion regarding fiscal conditions and what options are available," Wittkopf said.

If residents are "supportive of a modest assessment," then City Council members would consider approval of a mail-in voting process for residents to decide whether rates should be raised.

"There's no good way to reduce the budget to the way it needs to be reduced," Sassoon said. "Any way we make that adjustment, there will be an

impact on the appearance to the LMD. We've made it work for 19 years, but that's a decision for property owners to make.

Jerie Lee, a district resident who lives on Palo Verde Place, said that one option would be to charge higher rates for residents of the district who have observably more landscaping needs than most.

"Those that have more landscaping to maintain should be paying a higher rate than those of us that have so little," she said. "I live right off Day Creek Boulevard and Highland Avenue, and all along Day Creek there are very few trees; mostly palm trees and some landscaping ... There is very little maintenance."

She added, "I don't mind subsidizing the rest of the district, but they should at least pay more attention to Day Creek, which has the least amount of care on it. It should look pristine."

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Rental-car employees upset over ONT parking

ONTARIO — A move to consolidate employee parking lots at L.A./Ontario International Airport has a group of rental-car agency employees upset.

Starting Sept. 17, Los Angeles World Airports — which manages ONT — will do away with employee parking at Lot 5, which had been primarily used by those working at the neighboring car-rental facility.

The employees at the eight car-rental agencies at ONT were given the alternative to park in Lot 3, which is already designated for employee parking, said Nancy Castles, a LAWA spokeswoman.

Parking Lot 3 is between Terminals 2 and 4. Parking Lot 5 is adjacent to the rental-car facility, where public parking is available for \$9 a day. The other public parking lots, 2 and 4, cost \$18 a day.

LAWA has also added a designated shuttle stop to make it more convenient for employees, Castles said.

"This setup is commensurate to airport employee parking at LAX," she said.

On July 26, rental agency employees were notified of the pending changes through a letter from LAWA.

The eight rental agencies that operate out of ONT responded by sending a letter voicing their concerns, adding that they feel they are being penalized by the move.

The letter to LAWA states, "It is the consensus of all employees, that this is an internal audit/revenue issue inside your company, and has nothing to do with rental-car employees parking in Lot 5."

As of now, Castles said LAWA has not identified any cost savings with the move, but added that the move could make more room for the public to park at the busy Lot 5 and increase revenues, she said.

In their letter to LAWA, the employees also raised concerns about their safety since employees leave work at all hours of the night. Instead of walking over to parking Lot 5, they will have to wait for the shuttle.

"This is certainly not good customer service to the rental agencies and their employees. This is just another example of Los Angeles World Airport not supporting Ontario International Airport," the letter states.

Man hit by lightning airlifted to hospital

A man was being treated at a trauma center after being struck by lightning Sunday afternoon at Jenks Lake, San Bernardino County fire officials said.

Rescuers received a 9-1-1 call from the San Bernardino Mountains recreational area at 2:22 p.m. that a man had been struck by lightning, said Otto Schramm, dispatch supervisor for the county Fire Department.

A rescue helicopter airlifted the man to Loma Linda University Medical Center, authorities said. The man's condition was not immediately known.

The National Weather Service issued a flash-flood warning for parts of San Bernardino County. At about 2:40 p.m. radar indicated heavy rain from a thunderstorm near Twentynine

Palms. There were reports of lightning and thunder in Angelus Oaks and nearby areas.

According to the NWS, the odds of being struck by lightning in any given year is 1 million-to-1.

Rancho Cucamonga man fatally shot outside bar

A 24-year-old Rancho Cucamonga man was shot dead outside a Hesperia bar early Sunday, sheriff's officials said.

Witnesses said the shooting occurred after the unidentified man became involved in an argument at DJ's Bar and Grill, 12055 Mariposa Road.

The argument spilled out into the parking lot, where one of the men pulled out a gun and shot the victim, according to witnesses.

Investigators said the assailant fled in a vehicle. No descriptions of either the

shooter or the vehicle were immediately available.

'Crazy Cactus' exhibit runs through Sept. 30

A special summer exhibit, "Crazy Cactus," opened June 30 at the San Bernardino County Museum in Redlands. The exhibit, which is included with paid museum admission, will run through Sept. 30.

This exhibition grew out of the Crazy Cactus Art Project, developed as part of the Main Street Murals 2011 after-school youth program.

The program, called "Discovering the Mojave Desert," was held at the Desert Discovery Center in Barstow.

The project was devised by artist and production designer David Brockhurst using recycled, cast-off pieces of wood from an Earth Day mural project. Students painted freely, using the natural environment as their inspiration. The exhibit includes free-standing sculpture and photography.

"It was great collaborating with the children for this environmental art project," Brockhurst said. "Using recycled cast-off pieces of wood that came in many strange shapes and sizes was creative. It feels good to know that we haven't wasted any materials and we have created something unique to the Mojave Desert region that is youth-driven. Plus we had great fun during the creative process."

Exhibit explores role of fashion

A special exhibit, "The Fabrics of Our Past, 1860s to 1960s," opened April 28 at the San Bernardino County Museum in the museum's Crossroads in History gallery.

Michele Nielsen, curator of history and archives, organized the exhibition, which centers around costumes, accessories and textiles from the museum's permanent collections. The exhibit is sponsored in part by the Western Textile Center Association.

Just like today, fashion of the past was dictated in many ways by social and cultural norms, and clothing and textile design from bygone eras reflect these influences.

"The Fabrics of Our Past" gives visitors a chance to examine clothing and textile artifacts to learn more about the lives of the people who wore them and the world in which they lived," Nielsen said.

"Sometimes, subtle details reveal much, allowing us to think about their lives and circumstances in terms we can relate to — our own clothing and accessories."

Part of the focus of "The Fabrics of Our Past" is on the handworked aspects of the artifacts. The ability to sew a seam by hand, to embroider, to create beaded embellishment, to make lace, or to weave a fine cloth that could be used for clothing were valued skills long ago. Today, people enjoy carrying on these traditions, but often it is purely for fun and the chance for artistic expression, not because the skills are needed to be socially acceptable, or to have an occupation, as in the past.

The exhibit sponsor is the Western Textile Center Association, made up of member guilds who keep these historic techniques alive through their work. The guilds include the Inland Empire Handweavers Guild, the American Needlepoint Guild, the Bedazzled Beaders, and the Embroiderer's Guild of America, all dedicated to traditional techniques with a modern approach.

"When you visit the exhibit, examine your own wardrobe and then compare and contrast what you wear with some of the artifacts on exhibit," Nielsen said.

A series of programs that relate to "The Fabrics of Our Past" exhibit are scheduled at the museum during the run of the exhibit, which will close in late 2012.

The San Bernardino County Museum is at 2024 Orange Tree Lane, at the California Street exit from the 10 Freeway in Redlands.

Admission is \$8 for adults, \$6 for military and seniors, \$5 for students, \$4 for children 5 to 12 and free for children younger than 5 and Museum Association members.

Parking is free. The museum is accessible to people with disabilities. If assistive listening devices or other auxiliary aids are needed in order to participate in museum exhibits or programs, requests should be made through Museum Visitor Services at least three days before visiting the museum.

Massive cockfighting ring broken up

Two men arrested after police raid; about 1,000 gamecocks seized

ONTARIO — Two men are facing charges related to their suspected involvement in one of the largest cockfighting operations ever discovered in the region, authorities said.

Ontario police and officers from the Inland Valley Humane Society and SPCA on Sunday found the illegal activities in the 13100 block of Cucamonga Avenue, according to authorities.

An estimated 1,000 gamecocks were found, along with paraphernalia typically used in cockfighting.

"Out of all the years working for the Inland Valley Humane Society ... this has been one of the largest findings we have had," Humane Society investigator Sylvia Lemus said.

Antonio Cacayorin Mendoza, 57, of Chino was arrested on suspicion of misdemeanor cockfighting, and Dominador Oposcolo Soliven, 55, of Hemet was arrested on suspicion of misdemeanor animal cruelty, police Sgt. Rob Freire said.

Oliver Lopez, 55, of Menefee; Silvestre Colobong, 56, of Oceanside; and Virgilio Wong, 61, of Rancho Cucamonga; were cited by police for spectating the illegal game, Freire said.

Some of the people on the property for the Sunday cockfight told authorities they were employees of San Bernardino or Los Angeles counties, Lemus said.

They included a San Ber-

nardino County engineer and a Los Angeles County auditor, Lemus said.

San Bernardino County spokesman David Wert said county officials contacted Ontario police officers to confirm whether any employees had been arrested or cited.

"From what I understand, there is one county employee who is a civil engineer, not a manager or high-ranking person, who was cited for a misdemeanor," Wert said.

Oliver Lopez is a civil engineer for the county, Wert said.

"For a misdemeanor, it's probably something that his department takes a look at, but there are not usually consequences for a nonviolent misdemeanor," Wert said.

"This does not appear to be

job-related."

According to Los Angeles County assessor documents, a Virgilio Wong works for the department. L.A. County officials did not immediately return calls for comment.

Cockfighting involves trained roosters fighting each other in duels, typically to the death. The gamecocks slash each other with blades attached to their feet.

Illegal cockfighting is common in the agricultural areas of Chino and Ontario, Lemus said.

A Fontana home was also raided in April in Fontana and a man was arrested on suspicion of breeding hundreds of roosters for cockfighting.

"We do receive calls either for cockfighting or residents

having numerous game fowl on their properties," Lemus said.


Humane Society investigators and police officers responded to an anonymous call about a cockfight in progress Sunday afternoon on Cucamonga Avenue.

The property featured dozens of cages and overturned water drums used as rooster shelters.

A shed had apparently been used for training, according to investigators, and roosters were tethered to the overturned drums.

Police officers said one man was caught hiding cockfighting paraphernalia, Freire said.

Another suspect drove away with a rooster and was arrested by police after a traffic stop,

Freire said.

Humane Society officers collected numerous items related to cockfighting, such as metal blades, or gaffs, attached to roosters' legs during a fight. Training equipment and wager cards were also recovered.

"We had found paraphernalia which led us to believe there was a fight in progress and there were wagers," Lemus said.

It was the second time in a year the Inland Valley Humane Society had responded to cockfighting at that property, Lemus said.

Potential penalties for participating in cockfighting, include jail time, fines and probation, Lemus said.

the fundamentals of police work, taught by a variety of department employees. The curriculum and teaching methods are similar to the traditional police academy, but rather than new recruits, the academy's students are citizens, business owners, media representatives and neighborhood watchers. include virtually every aspect of police affairs, ranging from recruitment to undercover operations.

Citizens will gain a deeper understanding and appreciation of the problems facing police officers and the policies of the Redlands Police Department, according to a department news release.

Opposition figures meet in Damascus

Syrian opposition figures who reject foreign intervention in Syria's 18-month conflict called for the ouster of President Bashar Assad at a rare meeting Sunday in the nation's capital. The gathering was tolerated by the regime in an apparent attempt to lend credibility to its claims that it remains open to political reform despite its bloody crackdown on dissent.

A senior former Assad ally, meanwhile, said Iran is providing massive support for the embattled Syrian regime.

"Iranians are active in leading positions in the military," former Syrian Prime Minister Riad Hijab, who defected to the opposition last month, told the German daily Frankfurter Allgemeine Zeitung. "We're not only talking about military aid, but also logistical and economic support" by Iran.

Giant panda cub born at National Zoo dies

The giant panda cub born a week ago at the National Zoo in Washington died Sunday morning, saddening zoo officials and visitors who had heralded its unexpected arrival.

The 4-ounce cub, about the size of a stick of butter, showed no obvious signs of distress and made its final recorded noise shortly before 9 a.m. Sunday, zoo officials said at a news conference.

The cub's mother, Mei Xiang, then made an unusual honking sound at 9:17 a.m. that her keepers interpreted as a distress call, and she moved away from where she had been nesting with the cub. About an hour later, one keeper distracted her with honey water while another used an instrument similar to a lacrosse stick to pick up the cub.

The cub, whose gender could not be determined externally, was not breathing and its heart had stopped. A veterinarian attempted CPR before it was pronounced dead at 10:28 a.m.

Libyan army targets militias

UNREST: Group suspected in attack on U.S. Consulate says it's disbanded.

BENGHAZI, Libya — The Libyan army on Sunday said it raided several militia outposts operating outside government control in the capital, Tripoli, while in the east, the militia suspected in the Sept. 11 attack on the U.S. Consulate said it had disbanded on orders of the country's president.

President Mohammed el-Megaref said late Saturday all of the country's militias must come under government authority or disband, a move that appeared aimed at harnessing popular anger against the powerful armed groups following the attack that killed the U.S. ambassador.

The assault on the U.S. mission in Benghazi, which left Ambassador Chris Stevens and three other Americans dead, has sparked an angry backlash among many Libyans against the myriad of armed factions that continue to run rampant across the nation nearly a year after the end of the country's civil war.

On Friday, residents of Benghazi — the cradle of the Libyan revolution last year that toppled dictator Moammar Gadhafi — staged a mass demonstration against the militias before storming the compounds of several armed groups in the city in an unprecedented protest to demand the militias dissolve.

The government has taken advantage of the popular sentiment to move quickly. In a statement published by the official LANA news agency, the military asked all armed groups using the army's camps, outposts and barracks in Tripoli, and other cities to hand them over. It warned that it will resort to force if the groups refuse.

On Sunday, security forces raided a number of sites in the capital, including a military

outpost on the main airport road, which were being used as bases by disparate militias since Gadhafi was driven from the capital around a year ago, according to military spokesman Ali al-Shakhli.

Tripoli resident Abdel-Salam Sikayer said he believes the government is able to make this push now because, thanks to the country's first free election in decades that took place in July, the public generally trusts it.

"There was no trust before the election of the National Congress that is backed by the legitimacy of the people and which chose the country's leader. There is a feeling that the national army will really be built," he said.

The government faces a number of obstacles, though. It needs the most powerful militias on its side to help disband the rest. It also relies on militias for protection of vital institutions and has used them to secure the borders, airports, hospitals and even July's election.

Some of the militias have taken steps over the past several weeks to consolidate and work as contracted government security forces that are paid monthly salaries.

In the western city of Misrata, for example, resident Walid Khashif said dozens of militias held a meeting recently and decided to work under the government's authority. He said the militias also handed over three main prisons in the city to the Ministry of Justice to run.

Since Gadhafi's capture and killing, the government has brought some militias nominally under the authority of the military or Interior Ministry, but even those retain separate commanders and often are only superficially subordinate to the state. El-Megaref told reporters late Saturday that militias operating outside state authority will be dissolved, and that the military and police will take control over their barracks.

But it remains unclear if the government has the will — and the firepower — to force the most powerful militias to recognize its authority.



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
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

WHAT IS BEING PROPOSED?

The EIS/EIR will be prepared in accordance with regulations implementing the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA: 42 U.S.C. 4321 et seq.) of 1969 and the regulations implementing NEPA set forth in 40 CFR Parts 1500-1508 and 23 CFR Part 771, as well as provisions of the Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU). The purpose of this Notice is to:

- Advise the public that FTA is the lead Federal agency;
- Provide information about the proposed project, purpose and need for the project, and alternatives to be considered; and,
- Invite public and agency participation in the EIS process.

The EIS will examine alternatives to provide a cost-effective, alternative travel option for communities located along the Redlands Corridor in a way that improves transit mobility, travel times, and corridor safety.

WHEN IS THE PUBLIC REVIEW AND COMMENT PERIOD?

A public review and comment period for the EIS/EIR began on July 31, 2012 and will close at 5:00 p.m. on October 11, 2012. Public agencies and the public are invited to comment.

proved, Prop. 37 would be en-
forced by the State Health
Department which is already hav-
ing a hard time with current re-
sponsibility.

Dr. Kenneth Burke of Loma
Linda University said that in his
career as a biogenic researcher he
never come across anything
that would cause concern about the
human consumption of genetically
modified foods." Burke researched
the field for 30 years at the Loma
Linda University School of Allied
Health.

Burke admitted that conclusive
evidence might take one hundred
years. He is more concerned about
the lack of labeling of alcohol and

Professor Brian Federici at UC
Riverside that available data indicates
that genetically produced crops are
safer than organic crops
because they have reduced the use of pesti-
cides by millions of pounds per
acre. His colleague at UC Berkeley,
Peggy Lemaux, says she has
read through volumes of research
showing that chemically produced
pesticides show no negative effects.

Institutional Review Board
reports and the Union of Con-
sumers and the Union of Con-
sumer Scientists both wrote that
the study needs to be done in the
field of induced mutation plant
ings, that there is lack of re-
search done on healthy human
subjects. The Review Board states
that there are two studies needed:

a non significant risk study. The
producer and chemical maker will
use about \$5 million to fight the
initiative. Other makers of chemi-
cally produced foods are said to
add another \$20 million. Monsanto
has funded most university re-
search of genetically modified
foods. It paid \$100 million to the
UC system in a settlement over the







Overview

As part of the public outreach efforts for the Redlands Passenger Rail Project, the public outreach team assisted/coordinated with the delivery of several key communication tasks:

- Development of a comprehensive database of property owners along the entire proposed rail corridor, key stakeholders and interested parties to receive the Notice of Preparation
- Distribution of the Notice of Preparation and placement of advertisements in local papers to meet/exceed CEQA/NEPA public notification requirements
- Conduct scoping meetings
- Help document public comments received in writing

Scoping meetings were held in Redlands on April 24, 2012 and San Bernardino on May 2, 2012. These two-hour meetings provided stakeholders/the public an update on the project since the last time public information meetings were held a year ago. The team developed a PowerPoint presentation that reviewed key elements and explained the scoping process role in the development of a draft environmental document. This information was supported with project boards that showed the project area, proposed station locations and a sample of a passenger rail crossing. The public had the opportunity to have one-on-one discussions with the project development team. The public could provide comments via a certified shorthand reporter made available by the project team or by having them fill out comment cards.

More than 130 people, consisting of residents, employees, businesses, civic/community leaders and elected officials, attended the two meetings held at the ESRI Cafe in Redlands and the San Bernardino Hilton on Hospitality Lane – both locations in close proximity to potential rail station locations. Of note, the turnout of about 50 people in San Bernardino was the largest attendance to date in this city related to the project. There was a conscientious decision made to have the meeting in a new location specifically to increase public attendance.

Outreach Approach

Leading up to the scoping meetings, Westbound worked with HDR and SANBAG to identify appropriate stakeholders to receive the Notice of Preparation and meeting information. To meet and exceed notification requirements, the team completed the following tasks:

Advertisements

Placed ads in three newspapers – two dailies and one weekly.

- *San Bernardino Sun* - Published ¼ page ad on Thursday, April 12, 2012
- *Redlands Daily Facts* - Published ¼ page ad on Thursday, April 12, 2012
- *Inland Empire Community Newspapers* – Published ¼ page ad on Thursday, April 12, 2012. NOTE: Runs in all of the publishing group's papers – *The IE Weekly*, *Rialto Record*, *Colton Courier*, *El Chicano*

Agency Mailings – Westbound worked with HDR and SANBAG to identify and develop a targeted list of approximately 100 agency/key stakeholder contacts to receive a mailing of the Notice of Preparation informing them of the upcoming scoping meetings and an opportunity to provide comment during the 30-day review period. These mailings were sent out on April 10, 2012. Additionally, an email about the Notice of Preparation was sent out electronically on April 10, 2012.

Assessor's Parcel Number Mailings – Westbound leveraged an existing relationship with the City of San Bernardino's Economic Development Agency to get a complete list of property owners and mailing addresses for all parcels adjacent to the entire nine-mile stretch of the proposed project area. In all, approximately 400 Notice of Preparation documents were mailed out informing property owners of the upcoming scoping meetings and an opportunity to provide comment during the 30-day review period. These mailings were sent out April 11 and 12, 2012.

Database Notification – Westbound developed a notification of the Notice of Preparation and upcoming scoping meetings that was sent to approximately 900 contacts in the project database.

- First round notification emails sent April 18, 2012
- Reminder emails sent April 23 and May 1, 2012

Informational Flier Distribution – Westbound developed and distributed 200 fliers in the cities of Redlands and San Bernardino near potential station locations.

City Council Notification – Westbound provided information of the upcoming scoping meetings to the City of San Bernardino's mayor's office to be read at the April 16, 2012 city council meeting. Westbound also requested the City of Redlands to make an announcement at the April 17, 2012 city council meeting.

Other Channels of Communication Used to Notify the Public – In addition to the Notice of Preparation filed with the State Clearinghouse, following are other activities implemented to inform the public:

- Notice of Preparation made available on the SANBAG website on April 10, 2012 throughout the 30-day review period.
- Notification of scoping meetings sent to SANBAG board of directors and announced at SANBAG board meeting.
- Notification of scoping meeting at ESRI sent to all ESRI employees via email on behalf of the company encouraging attendance.
- Downtown San Bernardino Constant Contact database notification to approximately 400 local business leaders, residents, electeds and community-based organizations.
- Pre-meeting media outreach to get information covered in local newspapers. Resulted in coverage in April 17, 2012 edition of the *Redlands Daily Facts*.
- PowerPoint presentation used at meetings was made available to the public on the SANBAG website on April 25, 2012 – providing people unable to attend the meeting an opportunity to see the information presented.

Public Comments

To help keep track of public comments, the project development team established a project specific email (RPRP_Public_Comments@sanbag.ca.gov) that automatically forwarded information to a core team comprised of the project manager and agency, environmental and public outreach leads.

At each of the two meetings, the public had the option to provide comments in writing by filling out project comment cards (available in English and Spanish) or by verbalizing comments to a certified shorthand reporter attained through Gillespie Reporting & Document Management. As of the time of this report, 43 comments were received

during the 30-day review period that began on April 10, 2012 and concluded on May 10, 2012. NOTE: Comments received between May 10, 2012 and May 14, 2012 were accepted. Following are areas of comments received during the 30-day period:

Costs create dilemma in R.C.

Landscaping fees or services likely to change

RANCHO CUCAMONGA — As landscape maintenance costs for a large section of the city rise, officials are considering options to reduce service levels or increase assessment rates for residents.

Options are being considered for the city's largest landscape district — Landscape Maintenance District, or LMD No. 2.

The district is an L-shaped area bounded by Etiwanda Avenue in the east, the 210 Freeway in the north and the half-way line between Milliken and Haven avenues in the west. Base Line Road forms much of the southern border, except for the eastern end, which dips down to Church Street.

This fiscal year, a budget

shortfall for the district has been calculated at about \$222,000 as spending has outpaced revenue.

As maintenance costs have increased, officials say some sort of service-level adjustment or rate increase will be necessary, but residents be able to weigh in through a survey next spring. Before then, city officials will hold outreach events this fall.

"We would be able to make the budget work with the same LMD assessment in 1993, but costs are not the same as 1993, so it's really up to the property owners to decide," said Deputy City Manager Lori Sassoon said.

"Should we look at improved landscaping or invest in drought-tolerant landscaping, or look at reducing our maintenance costs? There's no way to maintain landscaping" at current rates, she said.

A meeting between public officials and residents held recently presented preliminary

ideas such as increasing the annual rate by about \$38 or decommissioning the care of 1.5 million square feet of grass turf.

Public Works Services Director William Wittkopf said the ideas are not final and that plans will be better defined through more feedback from the community.

"The idea of the public engagement process was well-received, and a lot of the folks like the idea of being able to have focused and detailed discussion regarding fiscal conditions and what options are available," Wittkopf said.

If residents are "supportive of a modest assessment," then City Council members would consider approval of a mail-in voting process for residents to decide whether rates should be raised.

"There's no good way to reduce the budget to the way it needs to be reduced," Sassoon said. "Any way we make that adjustment, there will be an

impact on the appearance to the LMD. We've made it work for 19 years, but that's a decision for property owners to make.

Jerie Lee, a district resident who lives on Palo Verde Place, said that one option would be to charge higher rates for residents of the district who have observably more landscaping needs than most.

"Those that have more landscaping to maintain should be paying a higher rate than those of us that have so little," she said. "I live right off Day Creek Boulevard and Highland Avenue, and all along Day Creek there are very few trees; mostly palm trees and some landscaping ... There is very little maintenance."

She added, "I don't mind subsidizing the rest of the district, but they should at least pay more attention to Day Creek, which has the least amount of care on it. It should look pristine."

Rental-car employees upset over ONT parking

ONTARIO — A move to consolidate employee parking lots at L.A./Ontario International Airport has a group of rental-car agency employees upset.

Starting Sept. 17, Los Angeles World Airports — which manages ONT — will do away with employee parking at Lot 5, which had been primarily used by those working at the neighboring car-rental facility.

The employees at the eight car-rental agencies at ONT were given the alternative to park in Lot 3, which is already designated for employee parking, said Nancy Castles, a LAWA spokeswoman.

Parking Lot 3 is between Terminals 2 and 4. Parking Lot 5 is adjacent to the rental-car facility, where public parking is available for \$9 a day. The other public parking lots, 2 and 4, cost \$18 a day.

LAWA has also added a designated shuttle stop to make it more convenient for employees, Castles said.

"This setup is commensurate to airport employee parking at LAX," she said.

On July 26, rental agency employees were notified of the pending changes through a letter from LAWA.

The eight rental agencies that operate out of ONT responded by sending a letter voicing their concerns, adding that they feel they are being penalized by the move.

The letter to LAWA states, "It is the consensus of all employees, that this is an internal audit/revenue issue inside your company, and has nothing to do with rental-car employees parking in Lot 5."

As of now, Castles said LAWA has not identified any cost savings with the move but added that the move could make more room for the public to park at the busy Lot 5 and increase revenues, she said.

In their letter to LAWA, the employees also raised concerns about their safety since employees leave work at all hours of the night. Instead of walking over to parking Lot 5, they will have to wait for the shuttle.

"This is certainly not good customer service to the rental agencies and their employees. This is just another example of Los Angeles World Airport not supporting Ontario International Airport," the letter states.

Man hit by lightning airlifted to hospital

According to the NWS, the odds of being struck by lightning in any given year is 1 million-to-1.

A 24-year-old Rancho Cucamonga man was shot dead outside a Hesperia bar early Sunday, sheriff's officials said.

Witnesses said the shooting occurred after the unidentified man became involved in an argument at DJ's Bar and Grill, 12055 Mariposa Road.

The argument spilled out into the parking lot, where one of the men pulled out a gun and shot the victim, according to witnesses.

Investigators said the assailant fled in a vehicle. No descriptions of either the

shooter or the vehicle were immediately available.

'Crazy Cactus' exhibit runs through Sept. 30

A special summer exhibit, "Crazy Cactus," opened June 30 at the San Bernardino County Museum in Redlands. The exhibit, which is included with paid museum admission, will run through Sept. 30.

This exhibition grew out of the Crazy Cactus Art Project, developed as part of the Main Street Murals 2011 after-school youth program. The program, called "Discovering the Mojave Desert," was held at the Desert Discovery Center in Barstow.

The project was devised by artist and production designer David Brockhurst using recycled, cast-off pieces of wood from an Earth Day mural project. Students painted freely, using the natural environment as their inspiration. The exhibit includes free-standing sculpture and photography.

"It was great collaborating with the children for this environmental art project," Brockhurst said. "Using recycled cast-off pieces of wood that came in many strange shapes and sizes was creative. It feels good to know that we haven't wasted any materials and we have created something unique to the Mojave Desert region that is youth-driven. Plus we had great fun during the creative process."

Exhibit explores role of fashion

A special exhibit, "The Fabrics of Our Past, 1860s to 1960s," opened April 28 at the San Bernardino County Museum in the museum's Crossroads in History gallery. Michele Nielsen, curator of history and archives, organized the exhibition, which centers around costumes, accessories and textiles from the museum's permanent collections. The exhibit is sponsored in part by the Western Textile Center Association.

Just like today, fashion of the past was dictated in many ways by social and cultural norms, and clothing and textile design from bygone eras reflect these influences. "The Fabrics of Our Past" gives visitors a chance to examine clothing and textile artifacts to learn more about the lives of the people who wore them and the world in which they lived," Nielsen said.

"Sometimes, subtle details reveal much, allowing us to think about their lives and circumstances in terms we can relate to — our own clothing and accessories."

Part of the focus of "The Fabrics of Our Past" is on the handworked aspects of the artifacts. The ability to sew a seam by hand, to embroider, to create beaded embellishment, to make lace, or to weave a fine cloth that could be used for clothing were valued skills long ago. Today, people enjoy carrying on these traditions, but often it is purely for fun and the chance for artistic expression, not because the skills are needed to be socially acceptable, or to have an occupation, as in the past.

The exhibit sponsor is the Western Textile Center Association, made up of member guilds who keep these historic techniques alive through their work. The guilds include the Inland Empire Handweavers Guild, the American Needlepoint Guild, the Bedazzled Beaders, and the Embroiderer's Guild of America, all dedicated to traditional techniques with a modern approach.

"When you visit the exhibit, examine your own wardrobe and then compare and contrast what you wear with some of the artifacts on exhibit," Nielsen said.

A series of programs that relate to "The Fabrics of Our Past" exhibit are scheduled at the museum during the run of the exhibit, which will close in late 2012.

The San Bernardino County Museum is at 2024 Orange Tree Lane, at the California Street exit from the 10 Freeway in Redlands. Admission is \$8 for adults, \$6 for military and seniors, \$5 for students, \$4 for children 5 to 12 and free for children younger than 5 and Museum Association members.

Parking is free. The museum is accessible to people with disabilities. If assistive listening devices or other auxiliary aids are needed in order to participate in museum exhibits or programs, requests should be made through Museum Visitor Services at least three days before visiting the museum.

Massive cockfighting ring broken up

Two men arrested after police raid; about 1,000 gamecocks seized

ONTARIO — Two men are facing charges related to their suspected involvement in one of the largest cockfighting operations ever discovered in the region, authorities said.

Ontario police and officers from the Inland Valley Humane Society and SPCA on Sunday found the illegal activities in the 13100 block of Cucamonga Avenue, according to authorities.

An estimated 1,000 gamecocks were found, along with paraphernalia typically used in cockfighting.

"Out of all the years working for the Inland Valley Humane Society ... this has been one of the largest findings we have had," Humane Society investigator Sylvia Lemus said.

Antonio Cacayorin Mendoza, 57, of Chino was arrested on suspicion of misdemeanor cockfighting, and Dominador Oposcolo Soliven, 55, of Hemet was arrested on suspicion of misdemeanor animal cruelty, police Sgt. Rob Freire said.

Oliver Lopez, 55, of Menefee; Silvestre Colobong, 56, of Oceanside; and Virgilio Wong, 61, of Rancho Cucamonga, were cited by police for spectating the illegal game, Freire said.

Some of the people on the property for the Sunday cockfight told authorities they were employees of San Bernardino or Los Angeles counties, Lemus said.

They included a San Bernardino County engineer and a Los Angeles County auditor, Lemus said.

San Bernardino County spokesman David Wert said county officials contacted Ontario police officers to confirm whether any employees had been arrested or cited.

"From what I understand, there is one county employee who is a civil engineer, not a manager or high-ranking person, who was cited for a misdemeanor," Wert said.

Oliver Lopez is a civil engineer for the county, Wert said.

"For a misdemeanor, it's probably something that his department takes a look at, but there are not usually consequences for a nonviolent misdemeanor," Wert said.

"This does not appear to be

job-related." According to Los Angeles County assessor documents, a Virgilio Wong works for the department. L.A. County officials did not immediately return calls for comment.

Cockfighting involves trained roosters fighting each other in duels, typically to the death. The gamecocks slash each other with blades attached to their feet.

Illegal cockfighting is common in the agricultural areas of Chino and Ontario, Lemus said.

A Fontana home was also raided in April in Fontana and a man was arrested on suspicion of breeding hundreds of roosters for cockfighting.

"We do receive calls either for cockfighting or residents

having numerous game fowl on their properties," Lemus said.


Humane Society investigators and police officers responded to an anonymous call about a cockfight in progress Sunday afternoon on Cucamonga Avenue.

The property featured dozens of cages and overturned water drums used as rooster shelters.

A shed had apparently been used for training, according to investigators, and roosters were tethered to the overturned drums.

Police officers said one man was caught hiding cockfighting paraphernalia, Freire said.

Another suspect drove away with a rooster and was arrested by police after a traffic stop,

Freire said. Humane Society officers collected numerous items related to cockfighting, such as metal blades, or gaffs, attached to roosters' legs during a fight. Training equipment and wader cards were also recovered.

"We had found paraphernalia which led us to believe there was a fight in progress and there were wagers," Lemus said.

It was the second time in a year the Inland Valley Humane Society had responded to cockfighting at that property, Lemus said.

Potential penalties for participating in cockfighting, include jail time, fines and probation, Lemus said.

Opposition figures meet in Damascus

Syrian opposition figures who reject foreign intervention in Syria's 18-month conflict called for the ouster of President Bashar Assad at a rare meeting Sunday in the nation's capital. The gathering was tolerated by the regime in an apparent attempt to lend credibility to its claims that it remains open to political reform despite its bloody crackdown on dissent.

A senior former Assad ally, meanwhile, said Iran is providing massive support for the embattled Syrian regime. "Iranians are active in leading positions in the military," former Syrian Prime Minister Riad Hijab, who defected to the opposition last month, told the German daily Frankfurter Allgemeine Zeitung. "We're not only talking about military aid, but also logistical and economic support" by Iran.

Giant panda cub born at National Zoo dies

The giant panda cub born a week ago at the National Zoo in Washington died Sunday morning, saddening zoo officials and visitors who had heralded its unexpected arrival.

The 4-ounce cub, about the size of a stick of butter, showed no obvious signs of distress and made its final recorded noise shortly before 9 a.m. Sunday, zoo officials said at a news conference.

The cub's mother, Mei Xiang, then made an unusual honking sound at 9:17 a.m. that her keepers interpreted as a distress call, and she moved away from where she had been nesting with the cub. About an hour later, one keeper distracted her with honey water while another used an instrument similar to a lacrosse stick to pick up the cub.

The cub, whose gender could not be determined externally, was not breathing and its heart had stopped. A veterinarian attempted CPR before it was pronounced dead at 10:28 a.m.

Libyan army targets militias

UNREST: Group suspected in attack on U.S. Consulate says it's disbanded.

BENGAZI, Libya — The Libyan army on Sunday said it raided several militia outposts operating outside government control in the capital, Tripoli, while in the east, the militia suspected in the Sept. 11 attack on the U.S. Consulate said it had disbanded on orders of the country's president.

President Mohammed el-Megaref said late Saturday all of the country's militias must come under government authority or disband, a move that appeared aimed at harnessing popular anger against the powerful armed groups following the attack that killed the U.S. ambassador.

The assault on the U.S. mission in Benghazi, which left Ambassador Chris Stevens and three other Americans dead, has sparked an angry backlash among many Libyans against the myriad of armed factions that continue to run rampant across the nation nearly a year after the end of the country's civil war.

On Friday, residents of Benghazi — the cradle of the Libyan revolution last year that toppled dictator Moammar Gadhafi — staged a mass demonstration against the militias before storming the compounds of several armed groups in the city in an unprecedented protest to demand the militias dissolve.

The government has taken advantage of the popular sentiment to move quickly. In a statement published by the official LANA news agency, the military asked all armed groups using the army's camps, outposts and barracks in Tripoli, and other cities to hand them over. It warned that it will resort to force if the groups refuse.

On Sunday, security forces raided a number of sites in the capital, including a military

outpost on the main airport road, which were being used as bases by disparate militias since Gadhafi was driven from the capital around a year ago, according to military spokesman Ali al-Shakhi.

Tripoli resident Abdel-Salam Sikayer said he believes the government is able to make this push now because, thanks to the country's first free election in decades that took place in July, the public generally trusts it.

"There was no trust before the election of the National Congress that is backed by the legitimacy of the people and which chose the country's leader. There is a feeling that the national army will really be built," he said.

The government faces a number of obstacles, though. It needs the most powerful militias on its side to help disband the rest. It also relies on militias for protection of vital institutions and has used them to secure the borders, airports, hospitals and even July's election.

Some of the militias have taken steps over the past several weeks to consolidate and work as contracted government security forces that are paid monthly salaries.

In the western city of Misrata, for example, resident Walid Khashif said dozens of militias held a meeting recently and decided to work under the government's authority. He said the militias also handed over three main prisons in the city to the Ministry of Justice to run.

Since Gadhafi's capture and killing, the government has brought some militias nominally under the authority of the military or Interior Ministry, but even those retain separate commanders and often are only superficially subordinate to the state. El-Megaref told reporters late Saturday that militias operating outside state authority will be dissolved, and that the military and police will take control over their barracks.

But it remains unclear if the government has the will — and the firepower — to force the most powerful militias to recognize its authority.

WHAT IS BEING PROPOSED?

Based on the input received from the community, including written comment letters, and preliminary findings from ongoing technical studies, FTA determined that an EIS is required. The EIS/EIR will be prepared in accordance with regulations implementing the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA: 42 U.S.C. 4321 et seq.) of 1969 and the regulations implementing NEPA set forth in 40 CFR Parts 1500-1508 and 23 CFR Part 771, as well as provisions of the Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU). The purpose of this Notice is to:

- Advise the public that FTA is the lead Federal agency;
- Provide information about the proposed project, purpose and need for the project, and alternatives to be considered; and,
- Invite public and agency participation in the EIS process.

The EIS will examine alternatives to provide a cost-effective, alternative travel option for communities located along the Redlands Corridor in a way that improves transit mobility, travel times, and corridor safety.

WHEN IS THE PUBLIC REVIEW AND COMMENT PERIOD?

A public review and comment period for the EIS/EIR began on July 31, 2012 and will close at 5:00 p.m. on October 11, 2012. Public agencies and the public are invited to comment.



Union of Concerned Scientists expressed concern about the confusion regarding jurisdiction that federal agencies like the FDA, USDA, and EPA already have among each other.

Earthopenessence.com in England states that nearly all of Europe has rejected genetic modified foods, that conventional plant breeding is safer. It talks of possible uncontrolled mutations in our food supply and that two harmful ingredients, pleiotropic and glyphosate, have currently been detected.

Proponents of Prop. 37 point to the Monsanto Company as its food safety.


According to the League of Women Voters, opponents of Prop. 37 say that the initiative would require extensive monitoring of foods that will increase food costs, and that enough measures are already in place to assure food safety.



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Dr. Kenneth Burke of Loma Linda University said that in his career as a biogenic researcher he never come across anything that would cause concern about the human consumption of genetically modified foods." Burke researched field for 30 years at the Loma Linda University School of Allied health.

Burke admitted that conclusive evidence might take one hundred years. He is more concerned about lack of labeling of alcohol and other products, which are directly related to plants and crops are produced by genetic mutations. Burke's concern about tobacco is concurred by the New England Journal of Medicine which published studies showing significant amounts of nicotine is already found in tomatoes and potatoes. The Journal quotes research showing that insecticides have been introduced into plant structure.

Professor Brian Federici at UCR says that available data indicates genetically produced crops are safer than organic crops have reduced the use of pesticides by millions of pounds per year. His colleague at UC Berkeley, Peggy Lemaux, says she has through volumes of research that chemically produced crops show no negative effects. Institutional Review Board book and the Union of Concerned Scientists both wrote that study needs to be done in the form of induced mutation plantings, that there is lack of research done on healthy human subjects. The Review Board states there are two studies needed:



The Ontario, Hesperia and Fontana city councils will have to adopt their own resolutions ratifying the formation of the joint powers authority. Hughes said he will present a draft resolution to his City Council on Tuesday.

The county has rolled out a list of 39 goals for next year that is said to mold the county into what its citizens desire it to be. The goals are subdivided into eight categories, including maintaining public safety, job and economic growth, ensur-

ing balanced development and provision of health social services.

Board of Supervisors Chairwoman Josie Gonzales said in a statement Tuesday that the Vision will come to life only when all sectors of the community work to make it a reality. "It will not take hold if only one entity, such as county government, is involved in carrying it forward," Gonzales said. "However, county government is accepting the responsibility to encourage those sectors to continue to work on achieving the vision."

Blewett said the joint powers

authority will put together a demonstration on the Homeowner Protection Program in the next 90 days.

tion to the case was not immediately clear.

What was clear to investigators last week was what Laurie Cone originally told police as they began investigating her husband's death.

She and the couple's 23-year-old daughter, Jackie, had returned from a day of gambling at San Manuel Indian Bingo and Casino early in the morning of April 2 to find the electric gate to John Cone's North Sierra Way repair shop — which doubled as the family home — forced open and his beaten body inside.

For the moment, that was the story.

And, in fact, investigators confirm in the police report that Laurie Cone and her daughter were captured on security footage at the San Manuel casino.

But the story emerging from investigators goes back years, painting a picture of a 29-year marriage tainted by a gambling addiction and the three failed attempts on John Cone's life.

The 3 alleged attempts

Over the past five years, Laurie Jean Cone had approached at least three men to kill her husband, who also was tipped off about an attempt to take his life just days before he was killed, according to the police affidavit.

According to the affidavit, Laurie Cone gave one man, the ex-boyfriend of her daughter, a 9-mm handgun in 2007 and asked him to "shoot her husband in the head and take his cash," offering him \$5,000 to do the job.

She allegedly offered another man a truck if he did the job; and she allegedly promised another man \$7,000 to \$9,000 and a split of her husband's gun collection and gold and silver bars in his safe.

The third man also told detectives that Laurie Cone contacted him for a murder for hire after he knew her for only a couple of days, according to the affidavit.

He had been allowing Laurie Cone to stay at his residence for a few days because she had nowhere else to go.

The source

This report is based on a Sesslin Affidavit, or supplemental police report, which includes probable cause information from police supporting the arrest of the suspects. The Sun obtained a copy of the report this week from Laurie Cone's case file in San Bernardino Superior Court.

She had even given him details to help him do the crime, such as a hand-drawn map showing the location of the bedrooms and a gun office, where John Cone kept his gun collection, according to the affidavit.

Laurie Cone reportedly told the man that she wanted it done before her daughter was released from Glen Helen Detention Center in Devore.

A different man told detectives that after Laurie Cone offered to give him a truck to kill her husband, he declined the offer and told his mother.

His mother told detectives she called John Cone on the Friday before his death and told him his wife had approached her son to kill him, according to the affidavit.

On April 3, Laurie Cone took a polygraph exam at the police station. The polygraph examiner told detectives the test showed deception. Laurie Cone stormed out of the building, according to the affidavit.

Her attorney told police later that day she would not make any further statements. The next day, she was arrested at 4:30 p.m. and taken to West Valley Detention Center in Rancho Cucamonga.

Gambling addiction

Aside from the background of the alleged attempts to kill John Cone, other details emerged from the police reports about his death.

The investigation showed John Cone was severely beaten with an unknown hard object and suffered severe blunt force trauma to his head.

John Cone was bound at the ankles and arms with duct tape and computer cord. Computer cord also was around his neck. The assault occurred in the bedroom, according to police.

John Cone was also a licensed arms dealer and his gun room had been forced open. Federal agents believe that 17 long guns, such as rifles and shotguns, were taken.

Surveillance cameras, which had been mounted inside and outside the business — D/C Radio and Television — had been damaged. Police say a recording device may have also been removed.

John Cone's 2003 Ford F-150 truck was missing. Police said they recovered the vehicle in Highland.

Investigators said the Cones had been in a relationship for 29 years but had been separated three weeks because of Laurie Cone's "compulsive and addictive gambling problem." She had been staying with a friend.

Jackie Cone told The Sun that her parents had been separated for two months because of her mother's gambling addiction.

"Mom said she was never coming back here and that she got all her stuff. She took dad's things and sold them for gambling money," Jackie said. "My dad was fed up. He changed all the locks and my mom got pissed."

Police say John Cone's wife and daughter were the last persons to see him alive at 11 p.m. April 1 and the first ones to find him dead.

Attempts to reach Deputy Public Defender Richard Lafianza, who represented Laurie Cone at her arraignment, were unsuccessful.

presented the study to the City Council last week.

"You have the resources to be the most beautiful city in the state," he said, but noted that many code enforcement employees are working at 60 percent of capacity and some at just 20 percent.

"I've never seen a productivity level that low," he said.

Goelitz recommends a number of changes, focusing on increased accountability.

Those include reorganizing the code enforcement division so that employees are assigned to specific geographic areas, rather than specializing in certain types of calls. And the progress by individual employees needs to be tracked, he said.

Other recommendations include prioritizing areas that often have code violations, retraining employees and shrinking the division by leaving many positions unfilled as employees leave.

A committee of City Council members is reviewing the recommendations. The full council will decide whether to make any policy changes.

Something needs to change, council members said.

That's what Margo Wheeler, who leads the Community Development Department, which is in charge of code enforcement, expected to find when she requested the study.

"I think we — the city manager and myself — we certainly had some concerns, but we wanted to bring in an outside expert to give us quantitative data," Wheeler said. "We're getting everything we need in place, and we've got a document that gives us great guid-

ance. "That's not to say there's not a lot of work to do."

Willkomm, who started six weeks ago, said he's already started making smaller changes that don't require council approval.

He and his staff have also started attending neighborhood association meetings — he went to two Wednesday — and advertising programs to give owners and managers the contacts and knowledge to keep their properties up to code.

"(The report) is a sobering wake-up call," Willkomm said. "Can we become more efficient? Yes, and we will."

That said, code enforcement officers and supervisors are hard workers who enjoy their jobs and should keep them, Willkomm said.

"They're good employees," he said, adding that San Bernardino's code enforcement division performs some functions other cities' agencies don't.

Several council members also said they were unsure whether downsizing the division was wise.

"It seems like we're penalizing the employees, letting them lose their jobs, for what should be the supervisors' responsibility," said Councilman Robert Jenkins.

Jodi Mansfield, a supervising code enforcement officer, said several aspects of the report could be misleading. For instance, some calls take far longer than others, and delays are often caused by legal proceedings, she said.

But she's also studied the report and takes much of it to heart.

"We can't be everywhere all the time, but we're open to the need to be more efficient," she said. "Even before the report, we knew much of this needed to happen. We can be a more proactive department, and we can make this a better-looking city."

History lesson for city

REDLANDS — Lovers of the city's history got a treat on Sunday when Joan McCall's book release party for "Redlands Remembered" was held at the Barnes & Noble here.

With a Sharpie in hand, McCall smiled as she signed copies of her book, which explores the city's history with stories and photos.

She began writing several months ago when she heard History Press was looking for someone who could provide a book on the history of Redlands.

Using stories from her former monthly column, "Regarding Redlands" — which was published in the Daily Facts from the mid-1990s to early 2000s — and other features on the city, McCall sent it to the publishing company in December.

McCall said she worked for six months to make sure stories were updated and facts were double-checked. She also provided pictures to go with each story.

A retired history teacher and librarian, McCall said doing the research was fun, adding that Redlands has "some wonderful his-

tory in terms of the buildings and places they've preserved, but also the interesting people that have lived here over time.

"It's fun to tell the stories (and) to find the stories, and going through old issues to see what was going on 100 years ago."

One of McCall's favorite stories is about Redlands High School.

Voters rejected the first bond issue for the school because they didn't like the selected site. It was near railroad tracks, and it was feared it would be too noisy for students and teachers.

"Not very long after they changed the location to where it is now," McCall said. "The bond issue passed for even more money than the first one."

The bond was for \$17,000, the amount that is being raised for the high school's Mural Project, which will display the school's original buildings constructed in 1891. The mural will include a view of the school's Clock Auditorium, built in 1928.

To help fund the mural, McCall partnered with Barnes & Noble to donate a percentage of purchases made at the store through Wednesday.

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Costs create dilemma in R.C.

Landscaping fees or services likely to change

RANCHO CUCAMONGA — As landscape maintenance costs for a large section of the city rise, officials are considering options to reduce service levels or increase assessment rates for residents.

Options are being considered for the city's largest landscape district — Landscape Maintenance District, or LMD No. 2.

The district is an L-shaped area bounded by Etiwanda Avenue in the east, the 210 Freeway in the north and the half-way line between Milliken and Haven avenues in the west. Base Line Road forms much of the southern border, except for the eastern end, which dips down to Church Street.

This fiscal year, a budget

shortfall for the district has been calculated at about \$222,000 as spending has out-paced revenue.

As maintenance costs have increased, officials say some sort of service-level adjustment or rate increase will be necessary, but residents be able to weigh in through a survey next spring. Before then, city officials will hold outreach events this fall.

"We would be able to make the budget work with the same LMD assessment in 1993, but costs are not the same as 1993, so it's really up to the property owners to decide," said Deputy City Manager Lori Sassoon said.

"Should we look at improved landscaping or invest in drought-tolerant landscaping, or look at reducing our maintenance costs? There's no way to maintain landscaping" at current rates, she said.

A meeting between public officials and residents held recently presented preliminary

ideas such as increasing the annual rate by about \$38 or decommissioning the care of 1.5 million square feet of grass turf.

Public Works Services Director William Wittkopf said the ideas are not final and that plans will be better defined through more feedback from the community.

"The idea of the public engagement process was well-received, and a lot of the folks like the idea of being able to have focused and detailed discussion regarding fiscal conditions and what options are available," Wittkopf said.

If residents are "supportive of a modest assessment," then City Council members would consider approval of a mail-in voting process for residents to decide whether rates should be raised.

"There's no good way to reduce the budget to the way it needs to be reduced," Sassoon said. "Any way we make that adjustment, there will be an

impact on the appearance to the LMD. We've made it work for 19 years, but that's a decision for property owners to make.

Jerie Lee, a district resident who lives on Palo Verde Place, said that one option would be to charge higher rates for residents of the district who have observably more landscaping needs than most.

"Those that have more landscaping to maintain should be paying a higher rate than those of us that have so little," she said. "I live right off Day Creek Boulevard and Highland Avenue, and all along Day Creek there are very few trees; mostly palm trees and some landscaping ... There is very little maintenance."

She added, "I don't mind subsidizing the rest of the district, but they should at least pay more attention to Day Creek, which has the least amount of care on it. It should look pristine."

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Rental-car employees upset over ONT parking

ONTARIO — A move to consolidate employee parking lots at L.A./Ontario International Airport has a group of rental-car agency employees upset.

Starting Sept. 17, Los Angeles World Airports — which manages ONT — will do away with employee parking at Lot 5, which had been primarily used by those working at the neighboring car-rental facility.

The employees at the eight car-rental agencies at ONT were given the alternative to park in Lot 3, which is already designated for employee parking, said Nancy Castles, a LAWA spokeswoman.

Parking Lot 3 is between Terminals 2 and 4. Parking Lot 5 is adjacent to the rental-car facility, where public parking is available for \$9 a day. The other public parking lots, 2 and 4, cost \$18 a day.

LAWA has also added a designated shuttle stop to make it more convenient for employees, Castles said.

"This setup is commensurate to airport employee parking at LAX," she said.

On July 26, rental agency employees were notified of the pending changes through a letter from LAWA.

The eight rental agencies that operate out of ONT responded by sending a letter voicing their concerns, adding that they feel they are being penalized by the move.

The letter to LAWA states, "It is the consensus of all employees, that this is an internal audit/revenue issue inside your company, and has nothing to do with rental-car employees parking in Lot 5."

As of now, Castles said LAWA has not identified any cost savings with the move, but added that the move could make more room for the public to park at the busy Lot 5 and increase revenues, she said.

In their letter to LAWA, the employees also raised concerns about their safety since employees leave work at all hours of the night. Instead of walking over to parking Lot 5, they will have to wait for the shuttle.

"This is certainly not good customer service to the rental agencies and their employees. This is just another example of Los Angeles World Airport not supporting Ontario International Airport," the letter states.

Man hit by lightning airlifted to hospital

Palms. There were reports of lightning and thunder in Angelus Oaks and nearby areas.

According to the NWS, the odds of being struck by lightning in any given year is 1 million-to-1.

A 24-year-old Rancho Cucamonga man was shot dead outside a Hesperia bar early Sunday, sheriff's officials said.

Witnesses said the shooting occurred after the unidentified man became involved in an argument at DJ's Bar and Grill, 12055 Mariposa Road.

The argument spilled out into the parking lot, where one of the men pulled out a gun and shot the victim, according to witnesses.

Investigators said the assailant fled in a vehicle. No descriptions of either the

shooter or the vehicle were immediately available.

Michele Nielsen, curator of history and archives, organized the exhibition, which centers around costumes, accessories and textiles from the museum's permanent collections. The exhibit is sponsored in part by the Western Textile Center Association.

"Sometimes, subtle details reveal much, allowing us to think about their lives and circumstances in terms we can relate to — our own clothing and accessories."

Part of the focus of "The Fabrics of Our Past" is on the handworked aspects of the artifacts. The ability to sew a seam by hand, to embroider, to create beaded embellishment, to make lace, or to weave a fine cloth that could be used for clothing were valued skills long ago. Today, people enjoy carrying on these traditions, but often it is purely for fun and the chance for artistic expression, not because the skills are needed to be socially acceptable, or to have an occupation, as in the past.

The exhibit sponsor is the Western Textile Center Association, made up of member guilds who keep these historic techniques alive through their work. The guilds include the Inland Empire Handweavers Guild, the American Needlepoint Guild, the Bedazzled Beaders, and the Embroiderer's Guild of America, all dedicated to traditional techniques with a modern approach.

"When you visit the exhibit, examine your own wardrobe and then compare and contrast what you wear with some of the artifacts on exhibit," Nielsen said.

A series of programs that relate to "The Fabrics of Our Past" exhibit are scheduled at the museum during the run of the exhibit, which will close in late 2012.

The San Bernardino County Museum is at 2024 Orange Tree Lane, at the California Street exit from the 10 Freeway in Redlands.

Admission is \$8 for adults, \$6 for military and seniors, \$5 for students, \$4 for children 5 to 12 and free for children younger than 5 and Museum Association members.

Parking is free. The museum is accessible to people with disabilities. If assistive listening devices or other auxiliary aids are needed in order to participate in museum exhibits or programs, requests should be made through Museum Visitor Services at least three days before visiting the museum.

Massive cockfighting ring broken up

Two men arrested after police raid; about 1,000 gamecocks seized

ONTARIO — Two men are facing charges related to their suspected involvement in one of the largest cockfighting operations ever discovered in the region, authorities said.

Ontario police and officers from the Inland Valley Humane Society and SPCA on Sunday found the illegal activities in the 13100 block of Cucamonga Avenue, according to authorities.

An estimated 1,000 gamecocks were found, along with paraphernalia typically used in cockfighting.

"Out of all the years working for the Inland Valley Humane Society ... this has been one of the largest findings we have had," Humane Society investigator Sylvia Lemus said.

Antonio Cacayorin Mendoza, 57, of Chino was arrested on suspicion of misdemeanor cockfighting, and Dominador Oposcolo Soliven, 55, of Hemet was arrested on suspicion of misdemeanor animal cruelty, police Sgt. Rob Freire said.

Oliver Lopez, 55, of Menefee; Silvestre Colobong, 56, of Oceanside; and Virgilio Wong, 61, of Rancho Cucamonga; were cited by police for spectating the illegal game, Freire said.

Some of the people on the property for the Sunday cockfight told authorities they were employees of San Bernardino or Los Angeles counties, Lemus said.

They included a San Bernardino County engineer and a Los Angeles County auditor, Lemus said.

San Bernardino County spokesman David Wert said county officials contacted Ontario police officers to confirm whether any employees had been arrested or cited.

"From what I understand, there is one county employee who is a civil engineer, not a manager or high-ranking person, who was cited for a misdemeanor," Wert said.

Oliver Lopez is a civil engineer for the county, Wert said. "For a misdemeanor, it's probably something that his department takes a look at, but there are not usually consequences for a nonviolent misdemeanor," Wert said.

"This does not appear to be

job-related."

According to Los Angeles County assessor documents, a Virgilio Wong works for the department. L.A. County officials did not immediately return calls for comment.

Cockfighting involves trained roosters fighting each other in duels, typically to the death. The gamecocks slash each other with blades attached to their feet.

Illegal cockfighting is common in the agricultural areas of Chino and Ontario, Lemus said.

A Fontana home was also raided in April in Fontana and a man was arrested on suspicion of breeding hundreds of roosters for cockfighting.

"We do receive calls either for cockfighting or residents

having numerous game fowl on their properties," Lemus said.

Humane Society investigators and police officers responded to an anonymous call about a cockfight in progress Sunday afternoon on Cucamonga Avenue.

The property featured dozens of cages and overturned water drums used as rooster shelters.

A shed had apparently been used for training, according to investigators, and roosters were tethered to the overturned drums.

Police officers said one man was caught hiding cockfighting paraphernalia, Freire said.

Another suspect drove away with a rooster and was arrested by police after a traffic stop,

Freire said.

Humane Society officers collected numerous items related to cockfighting, such as metal blades, or gaffs, attached to roosters' legs during a fight. Training equipment and wager cards were also recovered.

"We had found paraphernalia which led us to believe there was a fight in progress and there were wagers," Lemus said.

It was the second time in a year the Inland Valley Humane Society had responded to cockfighting at that property, Lemus said.

Potential penalties for participating in cockfighting, include jail time, fines and probation, Lemus said.

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SYRIA Opposition figures meet in Damascus

Syrian opposition figures who reject foreign intervention in Syria's 18-month conflict called for the ouster of President Bashar Assad at a rare meeting Sunday in the nation's capital. The gathering was tolerated by the regime in an apparent attempt to lend credibility to its claims that it remains open to political reform despite its bloody crackdown on dissent.

A senior former Assad ally, meanwhile, said Iran is providing massive support for the embattled Syrian regime.

"Iranians are active in leading positions in the military," former Syrian Prime Minister Riad Hijab, who defected to the opposition last month, told the German daily Frankfurter Allgemeine Zeitung. "We're not only talking about military aid, but also logistical and economic support" by Iran.

WASHINGTON Giant panda cub born at National Zoo dies

The giant panda cub born a week ago at the National Zoo in Washington died Sunday morning, saddening zoo officials and visitors who had heralded its unexpected arrival.

The 4-ounce cub, about the size of a stick of butter, showed no obvious signs of distress and made its final recorded noise shortly before 9 a.m. Sunday, zoo officials said at a news conference.

The cub's mother, Mei Xiang, then made an unusual honking sound at 9:17 a.m. that her keepers interpreted as a distress call, and she moved away from where she had been nesting with the cub. About an hour later, one keeper distracted her with honey water while another used an instrument similar to a lacrosse stick to pick up the cub.

The cub, whose gender could not be determined externally, was not breathing and its heart had stopped. A veterinarian attempted CPR before it was pronounced dead at 10:28 a.m.

Libyan army targets militias

UNREST: Group suspected in attack on U.S. Consulate says it's disbanded.

BENGHAZI, Libya — The Libyan army on Sunday said it raided several militia outposts operating outside government control in the capital, Tripoli, while in the east, the militia suspected in the Sept. 11 attack on the U.S. Consulate said it had disbanded on orders of the country's president.

President Mohammed el-Megaref said late Saturday all of the country's militias must come under government authority or disband, a move that appeared aimed at harnessing popular anger against the powerful armed groups following the attack that killed the U.S. ambassador.

The assault on the U.S. mission in Benghazi, which left Ambassador Chris Stevens and three other Americans dead, has sparked an angry backlash among many Libyans against the myriad of armed factions that continue to run rampant across the nation nearly a year after the end of the country's civil war.

On Friday, residents of Benghazi — the cradle of the Libyan revolution last year that toppled dictator Moammar Gadhafi — staged a mass demonstration against the militias before storming the compounds of several armed groups in the city in an unprecedented protest to demand the militias dissolve.

The government has taken advantage of the popular sentiment to move quickly. In a statement published by the official LANA news agency, the military asked all armed groups using the army's camps, outposts and barracks in Tripoli, and other cities to hand them over. It warned that it will resort to force if the groups refuse.

On Sunday, security forces raided a number of sites in the capital, including a military

outpost on the main airport road, which were being used as bases by disparate militias since Gadhafi was driven from the capital around a year ago, according to military spokesman Ali al-Shakhli.

Tripoli resident Abdel-Salam Sikayer said he believes the government is able to make this push now because, thanks to the country's first free election in decades that took place in July, the public generally trusts it.

"There was no trust before the election of the National Congress that is backed by the legitimacy of the people and which chose the country's leader. There is a feeling that the national army will really be built," he said.

The government faces a number of obstacles, though. It needs the most powerful militias on its side to help disband the rest. It also relies on militias for protection of vital institutions and has used them to secure the borders, airports, hospitals and even July's election.

Some of the militias have taken steps over the past several weeks to consolidate and work as contracted government security forces that are paid monthly salaries.

In the western city of Misrata, for example, resident Walid Khashif said dozens of militias held a meeting recently and decided to work under the government's authority. He said the militias also handed over three main prisons in the city to the Ministry of Justice to run.

Since Gadhafi's capture and killing, the government has brought some militias nominally under the authority of the military or Interior Ministry, but even those retain separate commanders and often are only superficially subordinate to the state. El-Megaref told reporters late Saturday that militias operating outside state authority will be dissolved, and that the military and police will take control over their barracks.

But it remains unclear if the government has the will — and the firepower — to force the most powerful militias to recognize its authority.

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
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

This process included the release of a Notice of Preparation (NOP) and two scoping meetings - one on April 24 in the City of Redlands and the other on May 2 in the City of San Bernardino.

WHAT IS BEING PROPOSED?

Based on the input received from the community, including written comment letters, and preliminary findings from ongoing technical studies, FTA determined that an EIS is required. The EIS/EIR will be prepared in accordance with regulations implementing the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA: 42 U.S.C. 4321 et seq.) of 1969 and the regulations implementing NEPA set forth in 40 CFR Parts 1500-1508 and 23 CFR Part 771, as well as provisions of the Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU). The purpose of this Notice is to:

- Advise the public that FTA is the lead Federal agency;
- Provide information about the proposed project, purpose and need for the project, and alternatives to be considered; and,
- Invite public and agency participation in the EIS process.

The EIS will examine alternatives to provide a cost-effective, alternative travel option for communities located along the Redlands Corridor in a way that improves transit mobility, travel times, and corridor safety.

WHEN IS THE PUBLIC REVIEW AND COMMENT PERIOD?

A public review and comment period for the EIS/EIR began on July 31, 2012 and will close at 5:00 p.m. on October 11, 2012. Public agencies and the public are invited to comment.



PYONGYANG, NORTH KOREA » North Korea gave foreign media access on Monday to three detained Americans who said they have been able to contact their families and — watched by officials as they spoke — called for Washington to send a high-ranking representative to negotiate for their freedom.

Jeffrey Fowle and Mathew Miller said they expect to face trial within a month. But they said they do not know what punishment they could face or what the specific charges against them are. Kenneth Bae, who already is serving a 15-year term, said his health has deteriorated at the labor camp where he works eight hours a day.

The three were allowed to speak briefly with The Associated Press in Pyongyang. North Korean officials were present during the interviews, conducted separately and in different rooms but did not censor the questions. The three said they did not know they were going to be interviewed until immediately beforehand.

IRAQ**Prime minister pledges to root out militants**

BAGHDAD » Iraq's outgoing prime minister pledged Monday to turn his country into "a big grave" for Sunni militants from the Islamic State group and commended security forces who achieved a rare victory over insurgents by ending the siege of a Shiite town.

Nouri al-Maliki made the comments during an unannounced visit to the northern community of Amiri, where he was greeted with hugs. A day earlier, Iraqi forces backed by Iran-allied Shiite militias and U.S. airstrikes broke a two-month siege of the town where some 15,000 Shiite Turkmen had been stranded.

In footage aired on state TV, al-Maliki was shown sitting at a wooden desk in front of a large poster of Shiite leader Grand Ayatollah Ali al-Sistani, ordering promotions and awards for those who fought in the battle.

"I salute you for your steadfastness and patience against those beasts and killers," he told a gathering of fighters in a large hall as they chanted Shiite religious slogans.

OUTBREAK**Senegal monitors contacts of first Ebola patient**

DAKAR, SENEGAL » Senegalese authorities on Monday were monitoring everyone who was in contact with a student infected with Ebola who crossed into the country, and who has lost three family members to the disease.

An Ebola outbreak in West Africa has killed more than 1,500 people in Guinea, Liberia, Sierra Leone and Nigeria. The university student is Senegal's first case of the dreaded disease. The 21-year-old left Guinea on Aug. 15, just days after his brother died of the disease, according to Guinea's Health Ministry. It said that the brother apparently caught Ebola in Sierra Leone.

The student traveled by road, crossing into Senegal despite a border closure. He arrived in Dakar, the Senegalese capital, on Aug. 20, according to the World Health Organization, and was staying with relatives on the outskirts of the city. The agency said that on Aug. 23, he went to a medical facility seeking treatment for fever, diarrhea and vomiting — all symptoms of Ebola but also many other diseases.

LABOR DAY**Obama: 'Revving' economy calls for higher wages**

MILWAUKEE » President Barack Obama renewed his push for Congress to raise the minimum wage Monday in a buoyant accounting of the economy's "revving" performance, delivered on behalf of Democrats opening their fall campaigns for the midterm congressional elections.

"America deserves a raise," he told a union crowd in Milwaukee, vowing to keep a hard sell on Congress in much the way he once courted his wife. "I just wore her down," he cracked.

Timing his push to Labor Day, the traditional start of the autumn campaign, Obama aggressively drew attention to recent economic gains, setting aside past caution on that subject.

"By almost every measure the American economy and American workers are better off than when I took office," he said, rattling off a string of improving economic indicators even while acknowledging not all people are benefiting. "The engines," he said, "are revving a little louder."

MARIJUANA**Will traffic deaths rise as states legalize pot?**

WASHINGTON » As states liberalize their marijuana laws, public officials and safety advocates worry that more drivers high on pot will lead to a big increase in traffic deaths. Researchers, though, are divided on the question.

Studies of marijuana's effects show that the drug can slow decision-making, decrease peripheral vision and impede multitasking. But unlike with alcohol, drivers high on pot tend to be aware that they are impaired and try to compensate by driving slowly, avoiding risky actions such as passing other cars, and allowing extra room between vehicles. On the other hand, combining marijuana with alcohol appears to eliminate the pot smoker's exaggerated caution and seems to increase driving impairment beyond the effects of either substance alone.

"We see the legalization of marijuana in Colorado and Washington as a wake-up call for all of us in highway safety," said Jonathan Adkins, executive director of Governors Highway Safety Association.

BRAIN TUMOR**Parents of ill UK boy fight extradition from Spain**

LONDON » The parents say they want to give their 5 year-old-boy with a brain tumor the best chance to live with a revolutionary new treatment they learned about on the Internet. Their British hospital says the boy has a 70 percent to 80 percent chance of survival with the treatment it offers, and it's the parents who are putting the child at risk. Britain has become riveted by the case of little Ashya King, whose parents plucked him from a hospital in southern England and fled to Spain amid a dispute over treatment — with British justice close on the family's heels.

Brett and Naghemeh King signaled Monday they would fight extradition, defying doctors and the legal system as a British court considers a ruling on forcing the family to come home.

"I'm not coming back to England if I cannot give him the treatment I want, which is proper treatment," Brett King said as he cradled the child in a video posted before his arrest. "I just want positive results for my son."

Pro-Russian rebels lower demands in peace talks

MOSCOW » Pro-Russian rebels softened their demand for full independence Monday, saying they would respect Ukraine's sovereignty in exchange for autonomy — a shift that reflects Moscow's desire to strike a deal at a new round of peace talks.

The insurgents' platform, released at the start of Monday's negotiations in Minsk, the Belarusian capital, represented a significant change in their vision for the future of Ukraine's eastern, mainly Russian-speaking region.

It remains unclear, however, whether the talks can reach a compromise amid the brutal fighting that has continued in eastern Ukraine. On Monday, the rebels pushed Ukrainian government forces from an airport near Luhansk, the second-largest rebel-held city, the latest in a series of military gains.

The peace talks in Minsk follow last week's meeting

between Russian President Vladimir Putin and his Ukrainian counterpart, Petro Poroshenko. The negotiations involve former Ukrainian President Leonid Kuchma; Russia's ambassador to Ukraine; an envoy from the Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe and representatives of the rebels.

Yet similar talks earlier this summer produced no visible results.

Unlike the previous rounds, this time rebels said in a statement carried by Russia's state-run RIA Novosti news agency that they are willing to discuss "the preservation of the united economic, cultural and political space of Ukraine." In return, they demanded a comprehensive amnesty and broad local powers that would include being able to appoint their own local law enforcement officials.

This deal is only for eastern Ukraine. There are no negotiations on handing back Crimea, the Black Sea peninsula that Russia annexed in March, a move that

cost Ukraine several major ports, half its coastline and untold billions in Black Sea oil and mineral rights.

The talks lasted for several hours Monday and were adjourned until Friday, when the parties are to discuss a cease-fire and an exchange of prisoners, rebel negotiator Andrei Purgin said, according to RIA Novosti.

The rebels' more moderate negotiating platform appeared to reflect Putin's desire to make a deal that would allow Russia to avoid more punitive Western sanctions while preserving a significant degree of leverage over its neighbor.

Over the weekend, the European Union leaders agreed to prepare a new round of sanctions that could be enacted in a week, after NATO accused Russia of sending tanks and troops into southeastern Ukraine. A NATO summit in Wales on Thursday is also expected to approve measures designed to counter Russia's aggressive actions in Ukraine.

U.S. eating habits improve a bit — except among poorer citizens

CHICAGO » Americans' eating habits have improved — except among the poor, evidence of a widening wealth gap when it comes to diet. Yet even among wealthier adults, food choices remain far from ideal, a 12-year study found.

On an index of healthy eating where a perfect score is 110, U.S. adults averaged just 40 points in 1999-2000, climbing steadily to 47 points in 2009-10, the study found.

Scores for low-income adults were lower than the

average and barely budged during the years studied.

They averaged almost four points lower than those for high-income adults at the beginning; the difference increased to more than six points in 2009-10.

Higher scores mean greater intake of heart-healthy foods including vegetables, fruits, whole grains and healthy fats, and a high score means a low risk of obesity and chronic illnesses including heart disease, strokes and diabetes.

Low scores mean people face greater chances for developing those ailments.

The widening rich-poor diet gap is disconcerting and "will have important public health implications," said study co-author Dr. Frank Hu of the Harvard School of Public Health.

Diet-linked chronic diseases such as diabetes have become more common in Americans in general, and especially in the poor, he noted.

"Declining diet quality over time may actually widen the gap between the poor and the rich," Hu said.

Harvard School of Public Health researchers developed the healthy diet index used for the study.
